## Barron County Sheriff's Department responds to accidents and issues a Code Red Alert

On Monday, May 8, 2017, at 8:28 a.m., the Barron County Sheriff's Department received a report of a possible missing 61-year-old male with a medical condition that went for a walk last night and had not returned. The Barron County Sheriff's Department responded and a check of the area was conducted, as well as interviews of a roommate and family. The Code Red Alert system, the county drone, as well as the Barron Police K-9 was used in the search. At 10:17 a.m. the subject was located at a friend's house and was uninjured. The Chetek Ambulance also assisted on this incident.

On Sunday, May 7, 2017, at 5:58 p.m., the Barron County Sheriff's Department received a call of a three-car head-on crash on Highway 8 west of Barron. Deputies from the Barron County Sheriff's Department, the Wisconsin DNR, Gold Cross Ambulance, Almena and Barron Fire Departments, Life Link Helicopter and the Turtle Lake First Responders responded to the scene.

Initial investigation shows a Chevy Impala, traveling west on Highway 8, driven by Thomas Elich, 47, of Hudson, crossed the center line and struck a Ford Focus traveling east on Highway 8, driven by Monica Waite, 21, of Cumberland, whose vehicle was then struck by a Toyota Prius traveling east, driven by Eugene Koci, 78, and his passenger Mary Ann Koci, 76, both of Eau Claire.

Waite and the Koci's were

all transported to the Barron Hospital for non life threatening injuries and Elich was treated at the scene. Elich was then arrested for Possession of Synthetic THC and Paraphernalia, and Injury By Intoxicated Use of a Vehicle, and is currently being held in the Barron County Jail.

The Barron County Sheriff's Department and the Wisconsin State Patrol are reconstructing the accident scene. Highway 8 was closed for about 2 1/2 hours.

On Saturday, May 6, 2017, at 1:06 p.m., the Barron County Sheriff's Department received a report of a two vehicle crash-pickup versus dump truck, on Highway P and 10 1/2 Avenue south of Almena. The Barron County Sheriff's Department, along with the Turtle Lake Police Department, Turtle Lake First Responders, Almena Fire Department, Gold Cross Ambulance and Life Link Helicopter all responded to the scene.

Initial investigation shows a Dodge Ram truck, driven by Lendra Miller, 21, of Almena, stopped at the stop sign at 10 1/2 Street and Highway P, and pulled into the path of a dump truck, driven by James Dreyer, 50, of Cumberland. Miller was ejected from the vehicle and her truck hit two more parked vehicles. Miller was flown to Mayo-Eau Claire with serious injuries. Dreyer was taken to Barron Hospital as a precaution.

Miller was cited for failure to yield right a way.

## Barron County Public Health warns of measles outbreak - Make sure your vaccinations are up-to-date

A measles outbreak is going on in Minnesota. Measles cases are showing up mostly in unvaccinated children ages birth to five years old in Hennepin County. However, measles cases have recently been reported in Ramsey and Crow Wing counties. Measles is very easily spread between someone with the illness and those around that person who are not immunized for measles.

"There are no reported cases of measles in Barron County or Wisconsin as of May 5. However, many people travel to the Twin Cities and back home every day so the risk to us is very real," states Laura Sauve, Health Officer. "We need everyone to help us prevent this disease. Make sure you have your measles immunizations and get your children vaccinated. The measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) shot is very good at preventing this disease and it is proven to be safe."

Measles is a disease caused by the measles virus. Because measles is caused by a virus, there is no treatment that will stop it once you start having symptoms. Getting vaccinated with two doses of Measles, Mumps, and Rubella (MMR) vaccine will prevent the illness about 97% of the time.

Measles often starts with fever, runny nose, cough, red eyes, and sore throat. It is followed by a rash that spreads over the body. Measles can lead to serious side

effects, including hospitalization and death. If you believe you have been exposed to measles and are having any signs or symptoms, stay home and contact your doctor or public health.

"Children under one year old and some people with allergies and health conditions cannot get the vaccine," reports Sauve. "We need everyone who is able to get the MMR vaccine to get it to protect loved ones and neighbors from this illness."

Children are usually vaccinated once at one year old and again at four-six years old. If your child has not been vaccinated, get them vaccinated now. Adults born after 1957 who have never had measles or never been vaccinated for measles should get vaccinated now. There are free vaccines available for children and most insurance plans will cover vaccinations. If you don't have insurance or are unable to pay for vaccines, check with your doctor or Barron County Public Health to see if you qualify for free vaccines.

Measles is can be a very serious disease, but it is preventable. Get vaccinated. Talk to your family, friends, and colleagues about the importance of getting the MMR vaccine. ## Public hearings and Amendments to Municipal Code on slate at May Council meeting

The Cumberland City Council met on Tuesday, May 1st to tackle a very full agenda.

During the public comment period, the council heard a presentation from Dave Armstrong with Barron County Economic Development on the current situation in Barron County. Armstrong stressed that one of the biggest challenges faced by businesses in the County is the lack of a workforce. He discussed the efforts of many Barron County employers to work with the School Districts and WITC to implement on the job training programs and internships to try and retain some of our young workers once they leave High School.

Dave further noted that a problem facing building a younger workforce is the lack of affordable housing. He stressed that "affordable" does not mean "low income." He is talking about single family housing for two

income families. There is a need for homes in the \$130-\$150,000 range.

After Armstrong's presentation, the council conducted two public hearings, one to allow a conditional use for a Home Occupation for building portable cabins/ice fishing houses and the second finished the process of dividing Islander Park into two parcels so that the Ice Arena was a stand alone property. Both actions were approved.

The council also approved amendments to two sections of the Municipal Code. The first was an amendment to the City Liquor License code to allow for "Cider Only" licensing. This would be an adjunct to the existing Class A licensing code and would allow for holders of existing "Beer Only" permits to sell cider as well. It did not create any new licenses.

The second amendment was to the Code governing special assessments. This

change makes it so that if the City has to tear up a street for sewer, water line or road construction the property owners will no longer be charged for replacing the curbs and gutters. This only affects future projects and does not grandfather in on-going projects.

Also approved by council were the following:

- A lease with Seneca Foods for the spray fields.
- Changes to the purchasing policy. The change refers to defining the "value" for vehicles or equipment purchases as being before trade-ins.
- A loan with Dairy State Bank for payment of the pick-up for the Waste Water Treatment Plant.
- Northern Lakes Community Church will be allowed to have workers camp on site during the construction of their new ministry center.
- CBS<sup>2</sup> was approved as the engineering firm for the street projects on Wickre Cir-

cle and 8th Avenue.

• Insituform Tech was awarded the bid for lining the sanitary sewer main on 3rd Ave.

• The purchase of a new welder for the City Shop. The old welder dates from 1950.

During committee reports it was announced that there will not be any Life Guards at the City Beach this summer. The ropes and platform will be placed and there will be signage announcing that no life guards are on duty.

It was also noted that the recent benefit for firefighter Jamie Sebens raised over \$30,000. Contributions came from fire departments all over the state as well as local community members and businesses.

The council then adjourned to closed session for the purposes of conducting employment and salary reviews.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, June 6th at City Hall.

### "Safety Tip of the Month"

#### "Scald Prevention"

A scald injury can happen at any age. Children, older adults, and people with disabilities are especially at risk. Hot liquids from bath water, hot coffee, and even microwaved soup can cause devastating injuries. Scald burns are the second leading cause of all burn injuries.

#### Scald Safety:

- Teach children that hot things can burn. Install anti-scald devices on tub faucets and shower heads.
  - Always supervise a child in or near a bathtub.
  - Test the water at the faucet. It should be less than 100 degrees Fahrenheit.
  - Before placing a child in the bath or getting in the bath yourself, test the water.
  - Test the water by moving your hand, wrist, and forearm through the water. The water should feel warm, not hot, to the touch.
  - Place hot liquids and food in the center of the table or toward the back of the counter.
  - Have a "kid-free zone" of at least three feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.
  - Open microwaved food slowly, away from the face.
  - Never hold a child while you are cooking, drinking a hot liquid, or carrying hot foods or liquids.
  - Never heat a baby bottle in a microwave oven. Heat baby bottles in warm water from the faucet.
  - Allow microwaved food to cool before eating.
  - Choose prepackaged soups whose containers have a wide base, to avoid the possibility of a spill, or pour the soup into a traditional bowl after heating.
- If you were to have a burn, treat it right away. Cool the burn with cool water for 3-5 minutes. Cover with a clean, dry cloth. Get medical help if needed.



Drug court forced me to grow up. Unfortunately for me I relapsed and was kicked out of drug court. But that doesn't change the fact that I learned a lot of stuff in drug court. It changed my life."


Josh didn't make it through drug court. He failed. Or did he? I've been writing Josh in prison for almost three years. He is a typical methamphetamine addict who ends up in drug court, and it was hard to watch this nice young man

fail. He could easily be your son or grandson, husband or father.

Who or what can better determine how successful drug court is -- former participants or statistics? Drug court greatly benefits even those who fail in it. Drug court is an intensely supervised program, which has lots of hoops to jump through. It teaches people, who never held a job, to get and hold a job. It teaches them how to manage money. It gets them regular counseling. In Phase One it holds them accountable weekly in front of the judge and the drug court team. It demands responsibility and it demands that you grow up.

Is Josh a drug court success or failure? I think he's a big success. Obviously, only time will tell. But unlike most people who get out of prison, Josh will leave with a job. Why? Because he called his old boss, who is

## Inside Wisconsin

### Wisconsin entrepreneurs succeed by surviving in a competitive world

MADISON – Depending on what's measured, Wisconsin can rank as one of the nation's worst states for entrepreneurial activity – or one of the best.

Sometimes, those extremes show up in the same national report.

Such is the case with the latest Ewing Marion Kauffman Foundation report on entrepreneurship in the United States, which once again ranked Wisconsin 25th among the nation's 25 largest states for startup activity but second best in "Main Street" entrepreneurship.

How can that contrast be explained, some may ask?

One ranking measures the number of people who become to decide entrepreneurs within a given period (the startup rate), while the other measures the percentage of the adult population that owns a business as their main job (the Main Street rate).

Still confused? So are many observers, myself included, who struggle to understand how a low startup rate by Kauffman methodology translates into a relatively high percentage of business ownership. The answer may lie in one word: Survivability.

As noted in the 2016 "Kauffman Index," 6.46 percent of adults in Wisconsin own a business, roughly one in 16 adults. The percent-

age of firms that remained in operation through their first five years is also high at 50.77 percent, based on the latest reporting year.

Minnesota, a neighboring state to which Wisconsin is often compared, showed up with similar rankings in the Kauffman Index. It ranked 21st in startup activity and 1st in "Main Street" ownership, with 7.75 percent of Gopher state adults owning a business. The five-year survival rate is shockingly similar to the rate in Wisconsin: 50.76 percent.

Other large Midwest states studied by Kauffman included Illinois (19th in startups and 10th in Main Street ownership), Michigan (11th and 13th); and Indiana (22nd and 11th). Each state has a strong five-year business survival rate.

Conversely, some states with higher startup rates also lose more companies after five years. Texas, Florida and California are ranked first, second and third in startups but statistically lose more of them over time.

Is it Midwestern stubbornness that keep the survival rate high in Wisconsin? A stronger work ethic?

Perhaps each trait deserves some credit, but it may also be argued that startups in Wisconsin and surrounding states are doing a better job of reaching out

for advice and resources that can keep them in business. The support system is strong and getting stronger by the year.

Providing a foundation for entrepreneurs to get the help they need is the goal of the annual Wisconsin Entrepreneurs' Conference, which will be held June 6-7 at Union South in Madison.

The 15th annual conference will feature speakers, panel discussions, company presentations and networking opportunities designed to connect entrepreneurs with the resources they need. Sometimes that means gaining access to investors, sometimes it means plugging into mentors, and sometimes it means meeting service professionals who understand business basics.

Entrepreneurs often learn the most, however, by listening to other entrepreneurs. Three featured speakers at the conference will provide that inspiration.

Zach Halmstad is the co-founder of Jamf, an Eau Claire company that grew from two guys with an idea to a company with \$110 million in annual revenue, 10,000 customers, eight offices in the United States and abroad, and 600 employees. Halmstad will receive the annual Ken Hendricks Memorial "Seize the Day" award and talk about his ex-

periences in building a high-tech company in a mid-sized city. He will speak June 6.

Arvind Subramanian is the chief executive officer for HealthMyne, a Madison-based company that is leaving a mark in the competitive world of health information technology and diagnostics. He's nationally renowned, not only for his technical expertise, but for his ability to build successful companies. Subramanian will speak June 7.

Alan Webber was the co-founder of Fast Company, a popular business and tech magazine that was the fastest-growing magazine in U.S. history. He's the author of four books on business and entrepreneurship, including his latest, "Rules of Thumb: 52 Truths for Winning at Business Without Losing Your Self." He will speak June 7.

Many people have good ideas for a business, service or product, but not everyone can build a company and keep it alive. Giving Wisconsin's tenacious entrepreneurs more tools to succeed is an underlying theme for the Wisconsin Entrepreneurs' Conference.

Still is president of the Wisconsin Technology Council, which produce the conference. He is the former associate editor of the Wisconsin State Journal.

She said her purse and its contents were stolen between February 5 and February 8th. Her husband later made contact with Detective Nelson and reported that his truck was also left unlocked in their open garage and he discovered he was missing a black colored plastic pistol case that contained a Taurus brand .22 caliber semiautomatic pistol.

On March 3rd Detective Nelson made contact with another female subject who stated that she had the Chevy Impala towed from her garage. She said the vehicle was used by her grandson's friend, Jerome Orsborn, who stayed at her residence on and off during the month of February. Detective Nelson made contact with the grandson, who said he lives with his grandmother and let his friend, Jerome Orsborn, stay there as well. He said that Orsborn went to jail and his grandmother didn't want his vehicle at her residence anymore so she had it towed.

On April 6, 2017, at approximately 10:00 a.m. Detective Nelson interviewed Orsborn in the Barron County Jail. He told Orsborn about the credit cards and personal documents belonging to other people located in his car that were connected to multiple thefts occurring in February. Orsborn said he was aware of what Detective Nelson was talking about. He said that on at least two different occasions he drove Sean Wells around areas throughout Barron County, where he said Wells went into unlocked cars and stole purses and credit cards. He said this happened in the early portion of February. Orsborn recalled stealing from vehicles on the north side of Hillsdale, in the Poskin area, and south of Almena. Orsborn said that he took all of the credit cards that were found in the vehicles because he planned on returning them to their owners because in didn't want to be involved in these cases.

Detective Nelson asked Orsborn if he recalled any firearms being stolen, and he said he did. He said that Wells had returned from stealing from a car with a silver-colored .22-25 semiautomatic handgun with a wooden handle. He said when they located cash, he used it for gas money. He stated he had borrowed a car from another female subject to commit the thefts.

On April 10, Detective Nelson met with Wells at the Barron County Jail. Wells said that he was "down and out" and decided to look for money in unlocked motor vehicles. He said that a female subject rode with them when

they drove to find vehicles to steal from, but she never left the vehicle. Wells said that he never kept any of the stolen credit cards and gave them all to Orsborn. He said that Orsborn told him he had a credit card reader or scanner that allegedly could be used to transfer the data to a different card. Wells said that they went to a minimum of five residences and located approximately \$60 in the vehicles, and split the money equally between the three of them.

Wells told Detective Nelson that he regretted his decision to steal from the vehicles, but needed money to survive and had been addicted to methamphetamine.

If convicted Orsborn and Wells could both be fined not more than \$25,000 or imprisoned for not more than 12 years and six months, or both. Their preliminary hearing will be held May 22, 2017.

Alex C. Briggs, Sr., 21, Barron County Jail, has been charged with battery by prisoners.

The criminal complaint states that on January 22, 2017, at approximately 5:39 p.m. Barron County Correctional Officer Hostettler was advised that there was a fight in C Block between Eldon Jackson and Alex Briggs.

Officer Hostettler interviewed both individuals. Jackson advised him that Briggs owed him food and that they were just talking when Briggs jumped up, shoved him and hit him in the face four or five times. He advised that his jaw was really hurting. Officer Hostettler observed that his jaw appeared to be swollen.

Officer Hostettler also interviewed Alex Briggs. Briggs advised that he and Jackson were playing cards and that he told Jackson that he was tired and this would be his last game. He said Jackson stood up and started yelling at him, at which point Briggs stood up. He also indicated that he felt threatened for his life and hit Jackson as self-protection. Briggs advised Officer Hostettler that Jackson was upset over the Packer game and that's what caused the incident. Briggs also indicated that he had been struck four to five times in the face. However, Officer Hostettler did not observe any swelling or marks on his face

Barron County Jail Sgt. Devine indicated that she had contact with Jackson after being advised of the incident involving Briggs. Her report indicates that Jackson told her he was hit in the jaw three or four times. She observed that his eyes were glossy and he had a hard time opening his mouth to talk. Her report indicates that Jackson was transported to the Barron ER, where he underwent a CT scan. She observed that his face had become more swollen and he could only say a couple words at a time. Sgt. Devine was advised that the CT scan results came back indicating that Jackson had fractures on his jaw on each side. Medical records that were obtained from the Eau Claire hospital confirmed the fractures. Jackson ultimately had to undergo surgery to have these repaired.

If convicted Briggs may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than six years or both. His initial appearance was held May 5, 2017.



So Selina is supposed to have a track meet this afternoon, but it snows and blows and so after a short practice after school, we head out to our blind to sit for the last few hours of daylight and hopefully call in a turkey.

**Friday, April 28th**

Necedah hosted a Middle School track meet after school today so Selina did a morning hunt until 9:00 and then it was off to school for Selina. We did not hear a gobble or see a bird.

**Saturday, April 29th - Prom Day**  
**High 39, low 27**

We were in our blind, which is in an oak forest by 5:10 this morning and once again did not hear a gobble or see a turkey. We sat tight until 10:30 and then we had to get going, as Selina was getting her hair done and pictures with her friends and her date at 4:00.

As a father I had a lot on my mind this day. Helping Selina get a turkey, fatigue for Selina. Selina having a great prom and the next days hunt. Selina was doing an all night fun activity with the school after prom and was scheduled to get home just in time for turkey hunting.

**Sunday, April 30th**  
**High 48, low 29**

Selina walked in the door at 4:30 this morning and was completely exhausted. I could not take her hunting; I have never slept in on a turkey hunt but did today.


We were comfortable in our blind at noon and ten minutes later we heard a light gobble that I figured was a jake. Soon, several turkey appeared about 80-yards away but would come no closer and I kind of thought it was because of several deadfalls between us.



## Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers



# Spring Clean Your Medicine Cabinet

It's time for the most important spring cleaning you can do—inside your medicine cabinet.

Two out of three of teens who report abuse of prescription medicine get them from friends, family, and acquaintances according to the Partnership for Drug Free Kids. Safeguard your home so the teens don't have access to your prescription medication.

Follow these steps to monitor, secure, and properly dispose of unused and expired prescription and over-the-counter medicine in your home:

**1. Monitor:** Take note of how many pills are in each of your prescription bottles and keep track of your refills.

**2. Secure:** Keep your prescriptions in a locked cabinet that teens cannot access.

**3. Dispose:** Safely dispose of expired and unused prescriptions at a designated medication drop-off site.

In Barron County, there are Med Return drop boxes available for people to safely dispose of medications. These drop boxes are accessible 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

"Prescription drug abuse is a problem in our area. Use these drop boxes to get unused medications out of your home and keep them out of the hands of people seeking to abuse them," states Barron County Sheriff Chris Fitzgerald. "If you have expired medications, drop them off. When a family member dies, drop their

medications off. If you have pills that you are no longer using, drop them off."

- Med Return drop boxes will soon be available in Chetek, Cameron, and some local hospitals.

Items that are accepted at Med Return boxes: prescription medications, controlled and non-controlled medications, medication samples, vitamins, medicated ointments/lotions, and inhalers.

Items that are not accepted: needles, liquid medications, thermometers, IV bags, bloody or infectious waste, personal care products, empty containers, aerosol cans, and business waste.

In recent years Buckthorn has experienced a surge in growth resulting in significant patches of new and mature trees in woodlots where a few years ago there was much less evidence of its presence. Buckthorn grows

several feet a year and in a few short years can leave a woodlot with a wall of 10-15 foot trees that neither man nor animal will walk through.

Buckthorn can be treated and removed year round though spring and fall are the best times of the year for identification and control efforts. A significant growth of Buckthorn has been identified at the park in Cameron.

The Cedar Lake Buckthorn Control Project and volunteers with support of a grant from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources will conduct the training.

Something you should know about...

## Mother's Day

Mother's Day (or the "Day of National Atonement," as I like to call it.) is this Sunday, May 14th. You know, that day when everyone scrambles to lavish gifts, cards, and praise upon those wonderful, long-suffering women whom we take for granted the remaining 364 days of the year (okay, maybe not ALL 364 days...we're usually nice on their birthdays and Christmas, too).

But do you know how it started? No, it wasn't some grand conspiracy concocted 100 years ago by the greeting card manufacturers, florists and candy makers of America to rob us of our hard earned money.

The earliest records of Mother's Day goes back to the ancient annual spring festival the Greeks dedicated to maternal goddesses. The Greeks used the occasion to honor Rhea, wife of Cronus and the mother of many deities of Greek mythology.

Ancient Romans, too, celebrated a spring festival, dedicated to Cybele, a mother goddess. Ceremonies in honor of Cybele began some 250 years before Christ was born.

Early Christians celebrated a Mother's Day of sorts during the festival on the fourth Sunday of Lent in honor of the Virgin Mary, the Mother of Christ.

In England the holiday was expanded to include all mothers. It was then called Mothering Sunday and dates back to the 1600s. After a prayer service in church to honor the Virgin Mary, children brought gifts and flowers home to pay tribute to their own mothers.

Sometimes servants, apprentices and other employees staying away from their homes, were encouraged by their employers to visit their mothers and honor them. Traditionally children brought with them gifts and a special fruit cake or fruit-filled pastry called a simnel.

The custom of celebrating Mothering Sunday died out in Europe almost completely by the 19th century. However, the day came to be celebrated again after World War II, when American servicemen brought our customs overseas with them and merchants jumped on the idea as an occasion to boost sales.

The concept of an official celebration of Mother's Day in America was first suggested by Julia Ward Howe (best known for her famous Civil War song, "Battle Hymn of the Republic") in 1872.

Howe suggested that June 2nd be annually celebrated as Mother's Day and should be dedicated to peace. She wrote a passionate appeal to women and urged them to rise against war in her famous Mother's Day Proclamation, written in Boston in 1870. She also initiated a Mothers' Peace Day observance on the second Sunday in June in Boston and held the meeting for a number of years. Julia tirelessly championed the cause of official celebration of Mothers Day and declaration of official holiday on the day. Her idea spread but was later replaced by the Mother's Day holiday in May.

Anna Jarvis, however, is recognised as the Founder of Mother's Day in the United States. Though Anna Jarvis never married and never had kids, she is also known as the "Mother of Mother's Day."

Jarvis got the inspiration of celebrating Mother's Day from her own mother, Anna Marie Reeves Jarvis. An activist and social worker, Mother Jarvis used to ex-

press her desire that someday, someone must honor all mothers, living and dead, and pay tribute to the contributions made by them.

When Anna's mother died in 1905, she resolved to fulfil her mothers desire of having a mothers day. To begin with Anna, conducted local events honoring her mother. Later Anna, along with her supporters, wrote letters to people in positions of power lobbying for the official declaration of Mother's Day holiday. The hard work paid off. By 1911, Mother's Day was celebrated in almost every state in the Union and on May 8, 1914 President Woodrow Wilson signed a Joint Resolution designating the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day.

More than 46 countries around the globe have a special day when they pay tribute to mothers. England for instance, celebrates Mother's Day on the fourth Sunday of Lent. Denmark, Finland, Italy, Turkey, Australia and Belgium celebrate Mother's Day on the second Sunday in May, just like the United States.

In Cameroon, Mother's Day is celebrated on the last Sunday in May. On that day, mothers are chosen to lead the worship service in Lutheran churches. In Mexico, Mother's Day is celebrated on May 10th. It is very common for mothers to be serenaded the night before with mariachis or other types of music. In schools, children prepare dances, poems, songs, plays and presents to honor their mothers. It is a popular day to treat mother to a dinner out or for someone else to prepare a special dinner at home.

The day has become so hugely popular that in several countries phone circuits are filled to capacity. There is also a tradition of gifting flowers, cards and others gift to mothers on the Mother's Day. The festival has become commercialised to a great extent.

In Taiwan, flowers are the gift most often associated with Mother's Day. Traditionally, the carnation and day lily are most popular. It is common to wear flowers representing one's mother, red if their mother is alive and white if their mother has passed away. Some people wear two flowers, one for their own mother and one for their mother-in-law.

It is unfortunate, however, that Anna Jarvis, who devoted her life for the declaration of Mother's Day holiday was deeply hurt to note the huge commercialization of the day. She spent her later years and all of her inheritance, fighting against the that commercialization.

One of the modern traditions that has grown up here in the United States is Mother's Day Brunch. My mother loved to do brunches. Preparing one herself or going out for special days, mom didn't care. That was her idea of a great meal.

Take a close look at the ads in this week's paper! There are many fine restaurants in Cumberland offering Mother's Day specials, and many of the merchants have deals to help you spoil your mom. Also, First Lutheran Church has a flower and bake sale between services (8 am and 10:30 am), where you can purchase homemade yummys or bouquets.

So please celebrate your mother! Show her how much her years of care and love have meant to you. You wouldn't be here without her!

I wish all mothers everywhere a blessed and happy Mother's Day.



## Airport Happenings

Welcome to the Cumberland Municipal Airport. My name is Richard Brekke and I am the manager at the airport. Unknown to many people the Cumberland Airport is one of the most vibrant General Aviation Airports in the region. It is always open and welcomes all visitors. Sandi Randall owns and operates Romeo Aviation which is the flight school based at the airport. She has three aircraft used for flight lessons and specializes in private pilot, instrument, float and tailwheel instruction. Romeo Aviation is one of the busiest flight schools in the region and is well known in the aviation community.

Also located on the airport is Aviation Resources. Owned by Jim and Lisa Barker it is a full service repair center concentrating on Cirrus Aircraft, which are made in Duluth. Their clientele include aircraft from all regions of the United States and they also travel overseas to service aircraft there. They expanded their facility this winter and currently

have 12 employees with future expansion already being planned.

The Island City Aero Club also claims the airport as home. The Aero Club is a group of dedicated local residents interested in aviation. You do not have to be a pilot or aircraft owner to be involved. The Aero Club is the entity that puts on the Pancake breakfast and airshow for Rutabaga Fest, sponsored by your airport.

The club is currently working on get aviation training and knowledge into our schools and obtaining a club aircraft to use for club flying and instruction in an attempt to make aviation more affordable to a larger number of people.

Over the last three years the airport has been able to repave the blacktop runway, ramps and taxiways, upgrade equipment and is currently working on developing a new hanger area as we are running out of hanger space. Unknown to most people all construction and improvements at the airport are funded by the collabora-

tion of the city, state and federal government. The FAA funds 90% of the money, the State Bureau of Aeronautics funds 5% and the City funds 5%. All of that money comes from the excise taxes paid by users of the aerospace system which include fuel taxes, seat taxes on the airlines, etc. It is not income tax money.

The month of May is National Learn to Fly Month. The airport is hosting an FAA safety Seminar here on Saturday May 13 entitled "Troubles on Takeoff." It is open to the public and is free. We will serve lunch at 12 noon and the seminar will start at 1pm. There will be other events throughout the summer to include a hamburger social, drone flying day and other events with dates and times being listed in this column. The public is welcome at all of our events. We have picnic tables here and it is a wonderful place to bring your lunch or dinner to eat. If the weather is nice there are usually airplanes around.
