## Annexations and Ordinances on agenda at March City Council meeting

The Cumberland City Council met in regular session on Tuesday, March 6th.

After dispensing with the regular business items, the Council moved on to the first of two agenda items dealing with property annexations.

First, the council approved a resolution accepting the annexation of property belonging to Dave DeSantis. Dave had purchased a piece of property on the south side of St. Anthony which connects to property he already owns. The property he already owns is inside the City Limits, the new property is not. Dave asked that the new parcel be annexed for continuity.

The second annexation issue was the passing of Ordinance 709 completing the annexation of the property purchased by the Hospital into the City. (See *Public Notices* on page 10 for a legal description of the property.)

The next items on the council's agenda were amendments to ordinances governing when either contractors or individuals can dig in our streets and right-of-ways. Unlike other area municipalities, this language just wasn't in our code so contractors would work in Cumberland as late in the season as possible.

The new language sets the cut off at October 15th and work may not begin until after April 1st. According to Julie Kessler at City Hall, "When they dig after that, especially in the street, everything doesn't get patched correctly or in a timely manner and then we get damage to our equipment especially when plowing snow."

The council also accepted a quote from Emergences for \$6,652.00 to repair the valves on lift station #2.

In her committee report on the Senior Citizen Center, Councilwoman Carol Wallin wanted to acknowledge the generosity of Cumberland Ace Hardware for their part in the repair of the garage roof. Apparently, when the Center tried to get (and pay) the bill for the materials used in the repair, the Friendly Folks at Ace told them it was taken care of. They had donated all the materials. The council expressed their thanks for the community support.

The council then voted to move into closed session for the purposes of "considering employment, promotion, compensation or performance evaluations."

Due to the Spring Elections on Tuesday, April 3rd, the next regular Council meeting will be held on Wednesday April 4th at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall.

## Future home of Cumberland Healthcare



Cumberland Healthcare has announced plans for a new replacement facility. The new facility would replace the current clinic and hospital, which was primarily built in the 50s and 60s. The property, located on US Hwy. 48 and 5th Street, would sit on 65 acres of land purchased recently. The new facility would help Cumberland keep up with changing technology. The project is still at least two and a half to five years out.

## Haugen man arrested on assault charges

On Saturday, March 10, 2018, at 2:51 a.m., the Barron County Sheriff's Department responded to Lakeview Medical Center

for a female who was assaulted. As a result of the investigation Jason Rush, 34, of Haugen, was taken into custody on charges of Aggravated Battery, False Imprisonment, Recklessly Endangering the Safety, Criminal Damage to Property and Bail Jumping from a domestic abuse incident that took place in the Village of Haugen earlier that

night.

The victim Angela Oftedahl, 45, of Haugen, was transported to another hospital where she remains with serious, but non-life threatening injuries.

Domestic violence and abuse can happen to anyone, yet the problem is often overlooked, excused, or denied. This is especially true when the abuse is psychological, rather than physical. ## Northwoods Notebook: Snowbird guilt - Maybe it's a Catholic thing by Larry Werner

## Frozen Road declaration ends/Spring Thaw; Class II road restrictionstakeeffectstatewide

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) announced the end of the frozen road declaration, and that Spring Thaw and Class II road restrictions took effect Wednesday, March 7, 2018 at 12:01 a.m. in Zones 1, 2 and 3. The changes are already in effect for Zones 4 and 5, meaning that beginning March 7th, the frozen road declaration will end, and Class II restrictions will be in effect statewide.

Class II roads include about 1,400 miles of state highways susceptible to damage from heavy trucks during the spring thaw period as frost leaves the ground. More information regarding

frozen road declarations, Class II roadways, and roadway postings can be found on WisDOT's website under "Weight Restriction Programs."

# Barron County Spring Garden Expo

The Barron County Master Gardener Volunteers will hold their Annual Spring Garden Expo on Saturday, April 7, at the WITC Conference Center in Rice Lake. Registration starts at 8:30am with gardening sessions beginning at 9:00am until 2:45pm. Pre-registrations are due at the Extension Office by Friday, March 30. Registration is \$30 and includes a continental breakfast, lunch and afternoon break provided by WITC. Registration the day of the expo will cost \$35 (lunch is not guaranteed).

Keynote speaker is Debbie Lonnee from Bailey Nurseries in the Twin Cities featuring cold climate gardening. Debbie will cover many of the new varieties of perennials, trees, shrubs, and annuals that have been introduced over the past 10 years.

As an avid gardener, Debbie has a collector's garden full of perennials and many new annuals. She is a member of the Perennial Plant Association and is a past president of the Minnesota Nursery & Landscape Association. For the past 25 years she has worked at Bailey Nurseries. In 2015, Debbie became the product

development manager, responsible for Bailey's new breeding farm in Georgia and working with breeders around the world, bringing new plants to the Bailey brands.

Crystal Schmidt, from western Wisconsin, will present "Rare and Unique Edibles for the Home Garden." Crystal and her fiancé live on a 19-acre homestead where they raise chickens, honey bees, and a large vegetable garden and fruit orchard. She blogs about their "All Things Gardening" adventures at wholefedhomestead.com. Weird blue sweet corn and cucumbers that look like potatoes are some of the rare vegetables and special herbs that she grows in her garden.

Susan Frame, Horticulture Instructor at Chippewa Valley Technical College in Eau Claire will present "Integrated Pest Management." Susan's education includes degrees in floriculture and plant science. Integrated Pest Management or IPM is a system of identifying pest problems and then implementing solutions using common sense approaches that minimize risks to people and the environment. Some of the strategies in the

IPM program are identifying the problem, monitoring of the situation, deciding if control is necessary and keeping records. Control measures can be cultural, physical, biological and chemical options. Susan's presentation will focus on vegetables and fruits.

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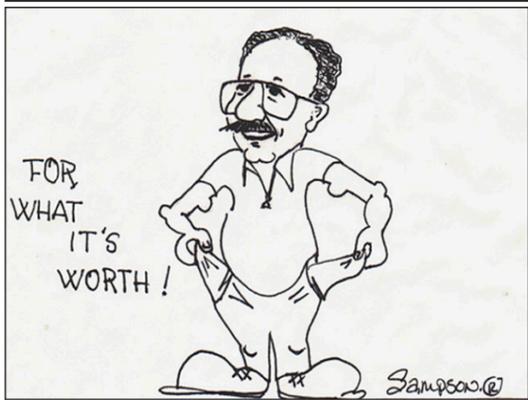
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# Opinion

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

## Inside Wisconsin

### Where broadband access is good, local businesses can go global

ASHLAND, Wis. – If you scan through the 20 or so customer reviews on the website for Superior Sauna & Steam, a company near the northern Wisconsin city of Ashland, you'll notice something right away: Few of the people who thanked the firm for its products and service are from Wisconsin.

That's because Superior Sauna & Steam, founded in 2004 as a business that once seemed destined to be confined to northwest Wisconsin, has found customers all over the United States and the world through its robust broadband connections to the internet.

"You can do business anywhere in the world if you have the right connections," said Chuck Porter, owner and managing partner of the firm, which makes and ships sauna heaters, doors, do-it-yourself kits, tubs and more from its plant in the Bayfield County Business Park.

Located three miles west of Ashland, the park is basically rural and wouldn't have strong broadband connections except for the fact developers recognized such service was a 21st century necessity. Norvado, a local provider that has installed about 2,300 miles of fiber

optic cable in its territory over time, serves the park and allows companies such as Superior Sauna & Steam to sell everywhere.

Porter said about 95 percent of the company's \$2.5 million in annual sales are from outside the region, a percentage that wouldn't be remotely possible unless people could find them on the internet.

His story was featured at a recent meeting of the Tech Council Innovation Network at Indianhead Technical College in Ashland, where more than 50 people gathered to talk about broadband service in northwest Wisconsin and to hear about attempts to improve it.

Those efforts include a mix of public and private strategies designed to help businesses, people and institutions in rural Wisconsin stay connected – and relevant – in the digital age.

Angie Dickison, the broadband director for the state Public Service Commission, said 55 state grants in 31 counties have spurred \$14 million in internet build-out in rural Wisconsin over five years. Another \$35.5 million is available in the 2017-19 state budget for competitive grants, some of

which will be announced in April. Another round of state applications will be due by July.

Federal grants through the Connect America Fund 2 and other programs are projected to connect about 300,000 Wisconsin households over 10 years, according to PSC estimates.

Because fiber optics is expensive to install – about \$30,000 per mile, depending on the terrain – other broadband options are being developed nationwide. They include use of television "white space," the buffer zones between channels; fixed wireless; small-cell systems; satellite broadband through SpaceX and Google's Project Loon, a network of balloons traveling the edge of the atmosphere.

Some will work and some may flop, but the mix of technology will be needed in hard-to-reach communities such as those in rural Wisconsin.

Strong broadband connections aren't just a "must-have" for business. They are essential to agriculture, emergency services, education and health care. Jason Douglas, chief executive officer of Memorial Medical Center in Ashland, told the crowd that quality and

timely care can depend on it.

"Telemedicine has made health care timelier, provided access to specialty doctors, and allowed (Memorial Medical Center) to maintain its independent critical-care hospital designation," said Douglas, who mentioned tele-pathology, tele-pharmacy and tele-stroke diagnosis.

A show of hands at the meeting revealed that while people agreed broadband service is better than five years ago, most said it must improve. Dickison agreed.

"Approximately 99 percent of the population in (Wisconsin) urban communities has access to broadband at 25 megabits speed levels ... in rural communities, it's about 57 percent of the population. That really does highlight the challenge we're talking about here," Dickison said.

That's a challenge that will require more public-private investment and cooperation for rural Wisconsin to keep abreast in the digital age.

Still is president of the Wisconsin Technology Council. He is the former associate editor of the Wisconsin State Journal.

from the Tahoe was left at the scene and it was taken to the police department, where it was photographed.

A witness at both crash scenes had a dash Go Pro activated, which captured both crashes. Upon further investigation officers determined that the vehicle that had left both crash scenes had a Wisconsin plate that was listed to C. Mitchell.

On Saturday, March 3, Officer Heather Wolfe of the Rice Lake Police Department spoke with C. Mitchell. The vehicle owner informed Officer Wolfe that she had sold the Tahoe to Anthony Hays.

Officer Wolfe then made contact with Hays at his father's home. She observed that Hays was extremely intoxicated and could barely stand or speak. He denied owning or operating the Tahoe.

On March 4, 2018, at approximately 9:00 p.m. Officer Bach of the Rice Lake Police Department, received a call from Hays, who indicated he wanted to confess to the hit and run. He said he was the driver of the Tahoe and that he did get into two accidents.

He said he had stashed the vehicle at the Murphy Flowage Campground in Rusk County. After that he called a friend for a ride to his father's house in Rice Lake, where Officer Wolfe made contact with him the previous day.

Officer Koenig observed on video that Hays nearly struck a third vehicle on Orchard Beach and was driving in the oncoming lane of traffic on the Orchard Beach. Hays indicated he had no recollection of this.

If convicted Hays could be fined not more than \$27,000 or imprisoned for not more than thirteen years and six months, or both. His preliminary hearing will be held March 15, 2018.

Shayne T. Trudelle, 43, of Shell Lake, has been charged with use of a computer to facilitate a child sex crime, child enticement, possession of methamphetamine, and carrying a concealed weapon.

The criminal complaint states that on February 14, 2018, Officer Heather Wolfe of the Rice Lake Police Department began an undercover child enticement investigation. At approximately 11:00 a.m. Officer Wolfe, purporting to be a young male, responded to a personal advertisement in the casual encounters section of the website Craigslist.org. According to the personal advertisement, a 42-year-old male was looking for a younger male to perform sexual acts with him. Officer Heather Wolfe responded to the ad stating she was a young male and was interested in his ad.

Approximately 36 minutes after sending her initial email, she received two emails in reply from an individual who was later identified as Shayne T. Trudelle, asking where the young male was located and if he had any nude pictures. She responded, she currently had no pictures. Officer Wolfe asked Trudelle if he minded that the young

male he would meet was a lot younger than him. Trudelle responded, in part, "it's cool." Officer Wolfe responded, stating "well I'm only 15, so we would have to go somewhere other than my house." Approximately three minutes later, Trudelle responded with his phone number to facilitate texting with the purported 15-year old boy.

After several texts between the two parties, it was arranged that they would meet at a motel in Rice Lake. Officer Wolfe called the motel to inquire as to whether Trudelle had checked in, and learned that he had not.

At approximately 5:24 p.m. Officer Wolfe texted Trudelle and asked if they were still meeting at the motel and he asked if he (the boy) would be cool with fooling around in the car?

After several texts back and forth between the two of them, Trudelle advised that he was willing to pickup the 15-year-old boy where ever. They agreed to meet in the parking lot of a department store in Rice Lake.

On February 22, at approximately 9:00 p.m. Rice Lake Police Officer Taylor parked his unmarked squad car in a fast food parking lot near the meeting place, to conduct surveillance for the proposed meeting.

At approximately 9:45 p.m. Officer Taylor observed a dark colored Jeep Cherokee pull into the fast food parking lot, with only a male driver, later identified as Shayne Trudelle, inside. The vehicle then exited the parking lot and headed westbound to the parking lot. While updating Officer Wolfe of the vehicle's presence in the parking lot, Officer Taylor was advised by Officer Wolfe, that the suspect had just sent a text message stating he was in the parking lot.

After Officer Wolfe received confirmation of the Jeep in the parking lot, she, Captain Hom, Investigator Thompson, Sgt. Bach, and Officer Taylor converged onto the parking lot. Officer Wolfe stopped her fully marked patrol vehicle directly behind the Jeep. She proceeded to exit her vehicle with her firearm drawn, and ordered Trudelle out of the vehicle with his hands up. She immediately recognized the man from the photograph sent to her via email on February 21st.

After Trudelle exited the vehicle, Officer Wolfe observed his zipper and button on his pants to be undone and his belt not fastened. After conducting a search of Trudelle, Officer Wolfe proceeded to take him to the Rice Lake Police Department.

A search was conducted of the Jeep Trudelle was driving and a syringe, and a gem bag containing white crystalline substance was found under the driver's seat. Also found was a Smith and Wesson 9mm handgun and \$278 in cash.

Trudelle did not have a valid permit to carry a concealed handgun at the time of his arrest.

If convicted Trudelle may be fined not more than

\$220,000 or imprisoned for not more than 73 years and nine months or both. His initial appearance was held March 9, 2018.

The criminal complaint states that on Thursday, December 14, 2017, Cumberland Police Officer Frey, was called to a domestic incident on 2nd Avenue in the City of Cumberland. The female subject called to report a domestic incident with her live-in boyfriend, Trinity Bader.

Officer Frey met with her at her residence. She reported she was in a physical domestic with Bader on December 12th. She said there was another female at the residence who is not supposed to be there and she was going to call Bader's probation agent to report him.

She stated Bader became upset. She said she grabbed her keys and was going to leave, but Bader would not let her leave. She said Bader threw her on the ground and held a knife to her throat. She said he was straddling over her and she was able to kick him and get him away from her neck. Officer Frey asked her how she got cut by the knife, and she stated she was probably cut as she was struggling to get away.

Officer Frey also spoke with another female subject who was there when the incident happened and she said she heard Bader say, "either you keep her mouth shut or you will be dead." The other female then left the residence.

If convicted Bader will be fined not more than \$20,000 or imprisoned for not more than six years and nine months or both. Upon conviction a domestic abuse assessment will also be imposed. He is scheduled to appear March 28, 2018.

## WisDOT: Be safe & responsible while celebrating St. Patrick's Day

*Law enforcement agencies across Wisconsin keep a sharp eye out for impaired drivers*

With St. Patrick's Day falling on a Saturday this year (March 17), it's likely that even more people will be out celebrating the holiday, creating additional concerns about the potential for impaired drivers. Officials with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) are asking all travelers to plan ahead, be responsible and never allow someone to get behind the wheel impaired.

"Whether it's caused by alcohol, prescription medications or any type of drug, impaired drivers are dangerous drivers who jeopardize everyone along our roadways," said David Pabst, Director of WisDOT's Bureau of Transportation Safety. "Law enforcement officers are well trained to spot and arrest impaired drivers. But our goal is to discourage people from making the dangerous and irresponsible decision to get behind the wheel impaired."

Things to keep in mind to ensure a safe and enjoyable St. Patrick's holiday:

- If you plan to celebrate, choose a sober designated driver. Make sure everyone in your vehicle is buckled up – every seat, every trip. Watch your speed, be patient and alert.

- If you're feeling buzzed, you're likely over the 0.08 BAC limit and should not drive. Take public transit, a taxicab or ask a sober friend to drive you home.

- Some taverns and restaurants have programs to provide patrons with a safe ride home. Visit [tlw.org](http://tlw.org) and select Safe Ride.

- Download WisDOT's free Drive Sober mobile app at [wi.trafficsafety.org](http://wi.trafficsafety.org) that includes a blood alcohol estimator, designated driver selector, and find-a-ride feature that uses a smart phone's GPS to identify transportation alternatives. Since its launch for St. Patrick's Day in 2013, over 73,750 people have accessed the app.

- Report impaired drivers to law enforcement by calling 911. Provide as much detail as possible on the driver, vehicle and location.

"St. Patrick's Day celebrants who get cited for impaired driving risk losing a lot of green," Pabst said. "An OWI conviction can cost around \$10,000 when you include fines, attorney fees, court costs, lost work time, higher insurance rates, car towing and repairs. Worse yet, impaired drivers involved in a crash can lose their life, hurt or kill someone else."

# An Outdoorsman's Journal

## Juneau County Game Wardens

**Hello friends,**

Originally I was going to be camped on the Mississippi River near Lynxville for this week's ice fishing adventure. That plan was literally flooded out when 1.5 inches of rain fell a few days before the trip was to take place.

Instead I did some research and chose Dead Horse Bay, which is located on the southwest corner of Green Bay. My goal was to catch a really big northern pike and some very tasty perch. My bonus plan was to be camped close enough to the channel of the Fox River to maybe catch a walleye or two after dark.

**Saturday, January 27th**

This week I am writing what I feel is a really cool story about Matt and his son Mike Weber, who just happen to be the conservation wardens for Juneau County.

I met these guys on a snowy afternoon this week and we sat around a campfire, shared a meal and I listened to their stories for five hours.

The year is 1984, Matt Weber is a senior at Crandon High School. Matt is a wrestler on Crandon's wrestling team but his real love is running his beagles for cottontail and snowshoe rabbits in Forest County.

In 1989 Matt married Denise Peeters of Necedah. In 1990 Mike Weber was born and that same year Matt went into training to become a conservation warden. In 1993 Matt Weber was given a permanent "station" in northern Juneau County.

Northern Juneau County just happens to be where my hunting camp is and the part of Wisconsin that is the love of my life. I met Matt in the mid 90s and was impressed every time we spoke. Having lived in that area for much of the 80's I have a lot of friends there and I can honestly say that Matt is a well liked conservation warden and blends in with the locals whether in uniform or hunting clothes.

In the year 2000 I moved my family to Necedah which was where the Weber's called home and young Mike Weber just happened to be in my stepson Travis's class. When Travis was in 8th grade Mike Weber joined the football team and both of

these kids would become lethal weapons on coach Eric Mach's, Necedah Cardinal football team for the next five years.

Mike and Travis were both standout wrestlers on Necedah's wrestling team with Mike taking 3rd at state, while wrestling at 215-pounds. Any parent that has raised a wrestler knows that you become a part of the team due to all of the Saturdays spent at tournaments. What I remember about Mike Weber is that he was always a gentleman, win or lose, he showed very little emotion and was always there for his teammates.

In 2002 I did a story on Matt Weber and his love for hunting rabbits with beagles. We hiked through rugged country, Matt got two shots at running snowshoe hares and both died. What was incredible was that he was using a .22 pistol.

After high school Mike Weber went to UW Stevens Point majoring in Resource Management- Law Enforcement with a minor in Natural Resources and then became a deputy on the Juneau County Sheriffs Department. Mike spoke very highly of his fellow officers on the sheriffs department and I personally feel the same way.

In 2014 Mike Weber went through training to become a conservation warden and the really cool story of a father/son team of conservation wardens in the same county began when Mike was given southern Juneau County for his station.

Like I said at the start of this weeks column we had a great time sitting around a pretty good sized campfire, shared a meal that was cooked over the fire, while what would be 6-inch snowfall took place.

I listened to Matt repeatedly go back to speaking about his love for hounds and how upon his late April (2018) retirement, training beagles would be his main pastime.

Yes Juneau County residents, Matt Weber is retiring in about 45-days. Perhaps there are people out there that do not like him as can happen to anyone in law enforcement but I can honestly say that I know a lot of people in this neck of the woods, and we are gonna miss you Matt.



## Ordinance 710 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING RIGHT-OF-WAY MAN- AGEMENT WITH REGARDS TO DATES THAT WORK CAN BE PERFORMED.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CUMBERLAND, BARRON COUNTY, WISCONSIN DOES ORDAIN THAT SECTION 1. RIGHT-OF-WAY MANAGEMENT, OF CHAPTER 8 STREETS, SIDEWALKS BE AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

### (3) Administration.

The Department is responsible for the administration of the Rights-of-Way, and the permits and ordinances related thereto.

#### Registration for Right-of-Way Occupancy.

(a) Registration. Each service, utility service or Right-of-Way user who occupies, uses, or seeks to occupy or use, the Right-of-Way or any facilities in the Right-of Way, including by lease, sublease or assignment, or who has, or seeks to have, facilities located in any Right-of-Way shall register with the Department and pay the fee set forth in Section 8.03 (5). Registration will consist of providing application information and paying a registration fee.

This section shall not apply to those persons exclusively utilizing facilities provided by another Right-of-Way user.

(b) Registration Prior to Work. No person may construct, install, repair, remove, relocate, or perform any other work on, or use any facilities or any part thereof in any Right-of-Way without first being registered with the Department.

(c) Exceptions. Nothing herein shall be construed to repeal or amend the provisions of a City ordinance requiring persons to plant or maintain the tree lawn in the area of the Right-of-Way between their property and the street curb, construct sidewalks, install street signs or perform other similar activities. Persons performing such activities shall not be required to obtain any permits under this Chapter.

**(d) No work may be performed in the right-of-way between October 15 and April 1 unless approved by the Director of Public Works for emergencies.**

### (13) Supplementary Applications.

(a) Limitations on Area. An excavation permit is valid only for the area of the Right of-Way specified in the permit. No Permittee may perform any work or excavate outside the area specified in the permit, except as provided herein. Any Permittee which determines that an area greater than that specified in the permit must be excavated must, before working in that greater area (1) make application for a permit extension and pay any additional fees required thereby and (2) be granted a new permit or permit extension.

(b) Limitation on Dates. An excavation permit is valid only for the dates specified in the permit. No Permittee may begin its work before the permit start date or except as provided herein, continue working after the end date. If a Permittee does not finish the work by the permit end date, it must apply for a new permit for the additional time it needs and receive the new permit or an extension of the old permit before working after the end date of the previous permit. **No permit shall be granted for work on City right-of-way between October 15 and April 1.**

(c) Fees for Supplementary Applications. A Permittee shall pay administration costs for any additional permits. A Permittee is not required to pay an additional degradation fee for the same excavation, if such fee has already been paid on the original permit.

## Wisconsin State Patrol Law of the Month: March 2018

Whether you're pulling a boat, a camping trailer or any type of towed equipment, make sure it's safely attached to your vehicle and that trailer tires, axles and lights are in proper working condition.

The Wisconsin State Patrol Law of the Month for March also reminds drivers to ensure that any load in a trailer or truck bed is properly secured to prevent items from jarring loose and becoming hazardous obstacles on roadways.

For towed equipment, state law requires that the ball and hitch coupling assembly be the same size and latch securely. The latching mechanism must be able to prevent disengagement of the trailer while

the vehicle is in operation, said Wisconsin State Patrol Captain Nick Wanink of the Northwest Region. Also, two safety chains of proper length and strength must be attached between the vehicle and the trailer with just enough slack to allow proper turning. It's also a good idea to crisscross the safety chains to create a cradle that can catch the tongue of the trailer and prevent it from striking the pavement if an unexpected disconnection occurs.

Failure to properly secure a trailer (Wisconsin law 347.47) can result in a \$200 citation with two demerit points added to a driver's license. More info regarding safety chains, cables and leveling bars can be found

in Wisconsin Transportation Administrative Code 308.12.

Wisconsin law also provides for a \$200 citation for failure to properly secure a load (348.10) or for spilling a load or waste along a highway (346.94). "Items that bounce out of trailers or away from trucks such as coolers, chairs, lumber or ladders become dangerous obstacles that can damage other vehicles or result in crashes when drivers swerve suddenly to avoid roadway debris," Captain Wanink said.

Covering a load is not required by law, but having a cover over a truck bed or trailer will help ensure that any load is properly secured and contained.
