## New TID & Police/School Liaison position approved at June City Council meeting

The Cumberland City Council met on Tuesday, June 5th at 7 pm for their regular meeting.

There was much business concerning the new utility owned and recently annexed properties. First, the council conducted a public hearing about, and approved a resolution on, the parcel split that would allow Don Johnson to purchase some of the new Utility owned land.

Next, the city approved a resolution to accept annexation of property, and an ordinance covering the annexation, of property which would create a right-of-way along the back of the new Utility Company land. This would allow the city ownership of the whole roadway.

The council also approved a resolution accepting the project plan and establishing the boundaries in order to create the new Tax Increment District #9. TID #9 includes approximately 470 acres in the City including the Cumberland Utility property purchased last year and then moves east into the Bents Fieldstone Subdivision, the Industrial Park, Lloyd's South Park Heights, the Islander Park property, Seneca spray field property (leased from the City) and the recently annexed property owned by Dave DeSantis. Tax exempt properties needed to be included as all of the property has to be contiguous to be included in the TID.

The Council also agreed to a request for new street

lighting on the frontage road at 2265 Superior Ave. (Cumberland Boat & Dock Lifts).

The council also approved the creation and funding of a Police/School Liaison position. This position will be paid 70% by the school district and the District would have control of this officer's hours during the school year. The City would pay the remaining 30% and have use of the officer during the month's when school is not in session.

The council also voted to compensate Rick Rieper for the extra Zoning duties he is doing. The council voted to pay Rick \$750 per month retroactive to April 1st.

The council agreed to an increase of 3% in the wages for the Campground Manager at Eagle Point. The council approved wage increases for other summer employment positions but inadvertently left out the Campground Manager. This corrected that oversight.

The council also approved a long overdue upgrade in the financial software used by the City. The current software is two updates behind and has been in use for 20 years. The cost of the upgrade (spread out over three years at \$4,500 per year) includes training.

After hearing committee reports, the meeting adjourned at 7:34 p.m. The next scheduled meeting is on Tuesday, July 3rd at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall.

## Sex Offender released to Rice Lake

The Barron County Sheriff's Department is releasing the following information pursuant to Wisconsin State Statute 301.46 which authorizes law enforcement agencies to inform the public of a sex offender's release when, in the discretion of the agency, the release of information will enhance public safety, awareness, and protection. The individual who appears on this notification has been convicted of a sex offense. Further, his criminal history places him in a classification level, which reflects the potential to re-offend.

This sex offender has served the sentence imposed on him by the courts. He is not wanted by law enforcement at this time. This notification is not intended to increase fear. It is our belief that an informed public is a safer public.

Sex offenders have always lived in our communities, but it was not until the Sex Offender Registration and Community Notification Law was enacted that law enforcement was able to share this information with the community. Citizens abuse of this information to threaten, intimidate, or harass registered offenders will not be tolerated and will be considered a criminal offense.

As a community, this notification provides us with an opportunity to work together by sharing information to enhance the public safety by increasing community awareness regarding this of-

fender and offering positive crime prevention suggestions.

The subjects name is Braden R. Conrad, age 31, height 5'7," weight is 217, he has brown hair and blue eyes. He was released on Tuesday, June 5, and will be residing at 2241 29th Avenue in Rice Lake.

He was convicted on November 7, 2007 of burglary, 1st degree occupied, and 1st degree criminal sexual conduct.

His conditions of supervision, not limited to: No unsupervised contact with individuals under the age of 18; Not to engage in any relationships without prior agent approval; and Absolute sobriety, No alcohol, drugs, paraphernalia, or bars, etc.

## Local author tells history of the Spooner Sectional

Beavers won a pair of titles. Ninety-plus schools; only one winner. It was tough to get to Madison.

Schools from Superior, Eau Claire, Ashland, and Rice Lake; as well as those from Iron Belt, Saxon, Westboro, and Milltown were grouped along with everyone else into a single tournament with only one team earning the right to represent northern Wisconsin at the state tournament.

Their stories have now been told in a book by former Spooner teacher and coach Carlo Kumpula. "When All Roads Led To Spooner" chronicles the first 29 years of the sectional, from 1943 through 1971, when there was just one tournament for all public schools. Every team's

goal was to play in Spooner, the site of the sectional tournament for nearly all of those years. Then, with a little luck, maybe they could make it to state.

Beginning in Spooner's old gym, where legends like Nate DeLong, Bud Grant, and Dick Axness took the floor and dynasties from Hurley and Superior Central were born; to the building of historic Anthonz Gymnasium where Rice Lake, Cumberland, and Eau Claire Memorial led the way, the book covers the tournament's history in detail.

"Spooner has such a rich heritage with respect to the sectional tournament," stated Kumpula as his reason for writing the book.







### Benson Family Singers to sing at Augustana

On Tuesday, June 12, 2018, at 4:24 a.m., the Barron County Sheriff's Department received a 911 call of a semi versus van traffic crash on Highway 8 west of 12th Street.

Deputies from the Sheriff's Department, along with the Gold Cross Ambulance, Barron Fire, Barron County First Responders and Life Link Helicopter responded to the scene.

Initial investigation shows a van, traveling west on Highway 8, crossed the center line and struck a semi that was traveling east on Highway 8, head on. The driver of the van was pronounced deceased

at the scene. The driver of the semi was transported to Mayo Hospital with non-life threatening injuries. The names of the individuals are being withheld until proper family notification is made

Highway 8 was closed for five and one-half hours for reconstruction and removal of the vehicles with the assistance of the Barron County Highway Department and the Barron Police Department.

The accident remains under investigation by the Wisconsin State Patrol and the Barron County Sheriff's Department.

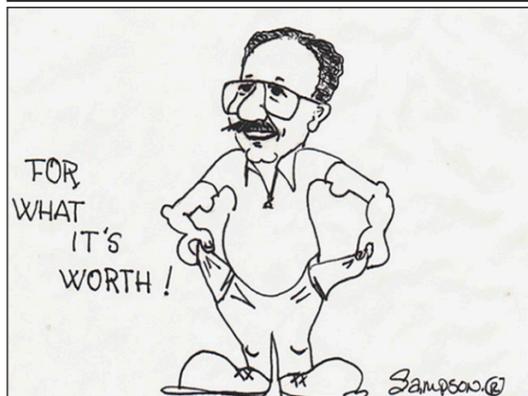

## Inside Wisconsin

### Solving real-world problems may distinguish Wisconsin, Midwest 'treps'

MADISON, Wis. — A day after NovoMoto won the 15th anniversary edition of the Governor's Business Plan Contest, a friend offered an anecdote about why he thinks the Madison-based company will be successful.

During a recent trip to Zambia, he was shown a new refrigerator that had been donated by a Japanese company to a remote medical clinic. The refrigerator was warm inside yet was still being used to store vaccines, which were likely useless. He was told there was no electricity to power the refrigerator because there was no kerosene to fuel its generator.

That's the kind of problem NovoMoto, founded by two UW-Madison doctoral students, hopes to solve through its pay-as-you-go approach to providing solar power to people, schools and communities in places such as sub-Saharan Africa.

NovoMoto has a social mission but it's also a for-profit enterprise. Founded by Mehrdad Arjmand and Aaron Olson, it employs a "rent-to-own" model for people to power mobile phones, appliances and other devices at roughly half the cost, with much more reliability and with less unhealthy exposure to kerosene lamps and generators.

Fueled by Wisconsin investors and grants, Novo-

Moto has deployed about 100 solar grids in a highly populated but dramatically under-powered region of the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

In winning the business plan contest at the annual Wisconsin Entrepreneurs' Conference, NovoMoto emerged from a pool of about 200 entries and competed against 11 other finalists. It was not the only "Diligent Dozen" company with a focus on solving problems, large or otherwise.

Here are some examples: AmebaGone develops natural alternatives to antibiotics, securing crop yields for potato and apple growers without chemicals and metals. DataChat builds chatbots that allow business users to extract insight from their data simply by talking with the chatbot. Pyran has developed a process to produce an environmentally friendly chemical to replace a legacy chemical in the manufacture of paints and plastics. AquaMetals has developed a new class of chemosensor films to continuously monitor the concentration of heavy metals in flowing water. Shockray Self-Defense has developed a non-lethal weapon that could mitigate use of excessive force by law-enforcement officers while keeping them — and citizens — safe. ReNeuroGen has developed a drug to mitigate

the aftermath of a stroke and the brain damage that often comes with it. Replace-A-Lace is a nylon shoe strap that replaces standard shoelaces, which can frustrate elderly and disabled people.

All are Wisconsin innovations and many are linked to core industries — such power and controls, agriculture, plastics, water, health care and manufacturing — that are traditional economic staples. While there are more "geewhiz" mobile apps and telecom devices being developed elsewhere, Wisconsin innovators often are making their mark by leveraging existing industries.

That observation was made more than once by investors who attended the two-day conference at Madison's Union South. Wisconsin won't become another Silicon Valley — nor should it aspire to do so. However, it is more likely to attract investors and customers by sticking to its core competencies and solving difficult problems.

It's not just true of Wisconsin but of other Midwest states, especially in places such as Iowa, which has become a leader in precision farming, and manufacturing states such as Indiana, Michigan and Ohio.

Brian Waller, head of the Technology Association of Iowa, told a room packed for the "Rustbelt Renaissance" discussion he has seen man-

ufacturers in his home state digitizing their manufacturing floors, hiring more IT specialists and emphasizing cybersecurity.

For example, Well's Blue Bunny Ice Cream of La Mars, Iowa, is an ice cream manufacturer that now prides itself on its technology.

"They see themselves as a technology company," Waller said. "They've harnessed business decisions with real-life data and dashboards... What you're seeing is manufacturers thinking differently, they're hiring differently."

In Wisconsin, the same trends are evident. Others at the conference said the arrival of Foxconn Technology Group in Racine County is expected to move manufacturing forward, create a tech-based supply chain and even spawn some new industry clusters.

Wisconsin and other Midwest states are attracting more attention from investors and major companies because innovation, talent and the cost of doing business compared to the East and West coasts have combined to create more value. Count pragmatic problem-solving as another Midwest virtue.

The criminal complaint states that on Sunday, June 3, 2018, at approximately 5:00 a.m., Cumberland Police Officer Nesseth, was dispatched to a residence on 8th Avenue in response to a reported domestic incident. Upon his arrival, Officer Nesseth made contact with a male subject, who was standing outside the residence. He indicated that Alexander S. Hopkins, had physically abused his daughter. Officer Nesseth later determined that Hopkins and the reporting party's daughter had been living together since March and they had recently moved to Cumberland. He further determined that the female subject had driven to her parents home and that is when Hopkins drove to Cumberland to confront her.

Officer Nesseth made contact with Hopkins inside the residence and noticed he smelled of intoxicants and had glazed eyes. He later determined that Hopkins was on probation with one of the conditions being not to possess or consume alcohol. Officer Nesseth administered a preliminary breath test to Hopkins and the result was .093. Hopkins told Officer Nesseth that he had physically grabbed the daughter to stop her from leaving. He said the fight-

ing happened somewhere between 3:30 a.m. and 4:00 a.m. and that she had left around 4:00 a.m.

Officer Nesseth then spoke with the father, who said his daughter had come home that morning with bruises on her arms and face from Hopkins striking her. Officer Nesseth made contact by phone with the victims' mother, and she agreed to bring her daughter to the Cumberland Police Department later in the day to be interviewed, give a statement, and have photographs taken of her injuries.

Cumberland Police Officer Westberg, was at the Cumberland Police Department at 2:00 p.m. when the female subject arrived to fill out a statement. Officer Westberg observed that she had visible bruising on her right eye that was reddish and purple in color. There was also bruising near her left cheek bone and her lip was swollen. Officer Westberg asked her if she received any other injuries during the incident, and the victim pushed back both sleeves on her arms, which revealed bruises on both of her forearms. The victim stated to Officer Westberg that she believed the bruises on her forearms were caused by Hopkins holding her and not allowing her to leave when he grabbed onto her arms. She then showed Officer Westberg her right leg and there was a significant bruise on her calf that was black and blue and purple.

She told Officer Westberg that they went out to the bar and left at bar close. She said when they arrived home they started to argue and yell at each other. She said she couldn't remember how they started arguing, she just remembered telling him to leave her alone and she did not want to be together anymore. That is when Hopkins started pushing her and grabbed her face. She said she tried to yell so the neighbors would hear and call the police, but when she tried, Hopkins put his fingers down her throat so she could not yell. She said she tried to call 911, but he took her phone and threw it across the apartment and told her she could not leave.

She said she tried to leave several times, but Hopkins would pick her up and throw her on the couch and yell at her. She then tried running up the stairs, but he grabbed her. She said he grabbed her head with one hand on each cheek and pounded her head against the bedroom wall multiple times. She told him to stop, because he was hurting her. She said she received a bloody nose some time during the incident.

She said she was able to get into her car and lock the doors, but the window was down and Hopkins was able to reach into the car and he then hit her in her right eye. She said she then drove to her parents' house.

If convicted Hopkins may be fined not more than \$20,000 or imprisoned for not more than six years and nine months or both. Because this charge is an act of domestic abuse, costs upon conviction would include the domestic abuse assessment imposed. His preliminary hearing will be held June 20, 2018.

Detective Carroll was approximately two vehicle lengths behind the vehicle and pulled up behind it, he was able to observe the registration of the vehicle. The vehicle then accelerated rapidly taking off from the side of the road, kicking up dust and gravel. Detective Carroll immediately notified Barron County Dispatch and activated his siren.

The vehicle continued at a high rate of speed while traveling eastbound on 13th Avenue. The vehicle began to slow at the intersection of 13th Avenue and 9 1/2 Street. Due to traveling at a high rate of speed, it took a wide corner while turning southbound. The vehicle then continued southbound on 9 1/2 Street at a slower rate of speed, approximately 30 miles per hour. The vehicle continued to fail to stop, at which point Detective Carroll utilized a pursuit intervention technique to end the pursuit, which resulted in the vehicle entering the west ditch facing sideways with Detective Carroll's vehicle pinning the driver's door shut with the front of his squad. The entire length of the pursuit was less than one mile.

The driver of the vehicle was identified as Lucas Paulson and in the front seat was a female passenger identified as Kayla Bass. Barron County Detective

Hagen arrived at his location and advised he had observed a plastic case lying in the roadway. It was suspected that the case was thrown from the vehicle, based on its location on the roadway, which was approximately 1/10th of a mile away from where Detective Carroll ultimately stopped the vehicle. Upon inspection of the box, it was apparent that it had been in the roadway for only a short time as it was dry and clean and not weathered and not broken in any fashion as might be expected if it had been run over by a vehicle.

The box contained a plastic cup that contained approximately 10.7 grams of suspected methamphetamine and a small palstic bag which contained approximately 6.60 grams of, what was suspected to be, methamphetamine. In addition a functioning digital scale was found in the box, along with a glass pipe that was suspected to be used to smoke methamphetamine. Based on Detective Carroll's training and experience, he believed the amount of methamphetamine located in the case, combined with the digital scale, was an amount much more than personal use and is more indicative of being possessed with intent to sell.

All of the windows in the vehicle were in an up and locked position except the front passenger window, which was completely rolled down. This is the location where Kayla Bass was seated. Detective Carroll asked her about the case. At first she stated she had seen the case, but then indicated that she meant that she has seen a case that looks similar. She denied any knowledge of what was inside the case.

Detectives Carroll and Hagen made contact with Paulson at the Barom County Jail, during the course of which Paulson indicated that he never should have given Kayla a ride, and he should have stopped when he was getting pulled over.

If convicted Paulson may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than three years and six months, or both. Upon conviction the department shall revoke his driver's license for six months. His preliminary hearing will be held June 15, 2018.

If convicted Bass may be fined not more than \$100,500 or imprisoned for not more than 25 years and 30 days, or both. If convicted her driver's license may also be suspended for not more than 10 years. Her preliminary hearing is scheduled for June 15, 2018.

Mitchell M. Berrier, 20, of Amery, has been charged with attempting to flee or elude an officer, and oper-

ating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, 1st.

On June 6, 2018, Rice Lake Police Officer Zachmann was on routine patrol at approximately 8:27 p.m. when he observed a red Pontiac Sunfire turning westbound on Allen Street from Main Street, in front of Officer Zachmann. Officer Zachmann observed a male operator of the vehicle, but was not able to identify the driver at that time.

Officer Zachmann followed the vehicle westbound on Allen Street. He activated the radar unit in the squad car, as the vehicle appeared to be pulling away from him. The reading on his squad radar indicated the vehicle was traveling at 37 miles per hour in a 25 mile per hour zone. Officer Zachmann pursued the vehicle westbound on Allen Street intending to conduct a traffic stop. The vehicle then turned northbound on Reuter Avenue and appeared to accelerate rapidly at a high rate of speed, as it traveled northbound. Officer Zachmann turned northbound onto Reuter Avenue and pursued the vehicle with his emergency lights and siren activated. The vehicle was approximately one block ahead of Officer Zachmann. He observed the vehicle hit the brakes when he activated the squad car's lights and siren, but then the vehicle again accelerated northbound on Reuter Avenue at approximately 55 to 58 miles per hour. Officer Zachmann was able to catch up to the vehicle near the intersection of Reuter Avenue and Messenger Street. The vehicle slowed for the stop sign, but did not stop, and then turned eastbound onto Messenger Street, and once again, accelerated rapidly. The vehicle then turned southbound onto Main Street, Officer Zachmann was approximately one quarter block away when it turned onto Main Street. The vehicle accelerated again as it traveled southbound on Main Street. Officer Zachmann continued to pursue the vehicle in the inside lane of southbound traffic. The vehicle speeds ranged from 55 to 62 miles per hour as he continued to pursue the vehicle. Near the intersection of Main Street and Charles Street the vehicle swerved and changed lanes to move around another southbound vehicle. Traffic was moderate and vehicles were yielding as Officer Zachmann continued to pursue the vehicle in front of him.

The vehicle turned eastbound onto Camelot Lane. When Officers Zachmann and Thon approached Camelot Lane, they observed the vehicle parked on the east side of the apartment complex. The driver of the vehicle, who was later identified as Mitchell M. Berrier, had the driver's door open and was attempting to exit the vehicle. Officers Zachmann and Thon

commanded Berrier to exit the vehicle and walk backwards to where the officers were positioned, where Berrier was handcuffed and detained in the rear of Officer Thons' squad car.

Officer Zachmann asked Berrier to step out of the squad car and advised him he was under arrest for felony fleeing/eluding an officer. As Officer Zachmann was speaking with him, he observed Zachmann's eyes to be glossy and bloodshot. He also observed him squinting and not able to open his eyes completely. Officer Zachmann then requested him to perform field sobriety tests. Berrier then stated, "I smoked weed a couple hours ago so why do we even have to do these tests." He then agreed to perform the field sobriety tests, but failed to perform them satisfactorily.

A neighbor then came out of the apartment complex and told Officer Thon that he knew this was going to happen, referring to the chase, because he heard Berrier say before he left the building that if law enforcement tried to pull him over, he was not going to stop.

If convicted Berrier may be fined not more than \$10,300 or imprisoned for not more than three years and six months, or both. His driver's license shall be revoked for not more than one year and three months, and he shall be ordered to submit to an alcohol and drug abuse assessment. His preliminary hearing will be held June 15, 2018.

For the greatest comfort at your computer, you might benefit from having a separate pair of glasses with a prescription that's specific to the distance between you and your computer monitor.

June 15th is World Elder Abuse Awareness Day, and the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) would like to raise awareness of one of the primary ways that seniors are abused: financial fraud. As a recent example, a Federal Trade Commission report noted that consumers between the ages of 70-79 who fell for scams last year had a median loss of more than \$600, and consumers aged 80 and over lost nearly \$1,100 - more than 2.5 times more money than victims in their twenties (\$400 loss).

"Numerous scams target seniors at a higher rate than the general public, so DATCP makes an extra effort to inform seniors about the warning signs of a scam," said Michelle Reinen, Director of the Bureau of Consumer Protection. "Our best tool to aid in the fight against scams is education, and we implore consumers to share their knowledge of fraud risks with older friends and relatives."

DATCP is the state's primary consumer protection

agency and has authority to regulate unfair business practices. The Consumer Protection Hotline (800-422-7128, [datcp@wi.gov](mailto:datcp@wi.gov)) helps to provide answers to consumer questions and the Bureau of Consumer Protection mediates consumer complaints. The Bureau also monitors all complaints for trends and patterns of behavior that require further investigation to enforce state laws, especially those complaints involving seniors.

One of DATCP's key educational resources addresses financial elder abuse head on. DATCP's Senior Guide is a 50+ page booklet that helps older adults identify scams and work through difficult consumer issues. The guide is available as a free download on the DATCP website ([datcp.wi.gov](http://datcp.wi.gov)) or a printed copy can be requested by contacting the Consumer Protection Hotline.

If you are an older consumer (or the loved one of a senior) who has been

targeted or victimized by a scammer or who is facing a difficult consumer matter, DATCP is here to lend a hand:

I am an officer for a government agency working at a disability/welfare office and I got to see the coolest thing today.

A homeless man, Charlie, came in with a power wheelchair that didn't work. It's batteries would no longer charge.

As I was pushing him around the office, first to get checked in, then to an outlet to get some charge in his batteries, then back to a window to be seen... etc. A woman noticed and asked Charlie if his chair was dead and how long he had it.

He's needed it for about three years now, after he got stabbed in the back of the neck leaving him paralyzed on the left side. He's on disability and doesn't have much money to replace the battery which will now only hold a charge for about ten minutes, so he mostly just pushes himself around with his right foot, traveling backwards.

The Woman, Diane, explained that her brother is also paralyzed and they have an older chair that they're not using. She asked Charlie if he would like it.

Charlie said yes.

Diane left and came back about an hour later. She asked me to unload the new chair, which I did. Now, I don't know much about powered wheelchairs, but I can tell this is no basic model. It not only drives, it can lift up, recline, and do other stuff too. Turns out it's like a \$20,000 chair.

Charlie looked it over and said it sure is nice. But Diane tells us there's one small problem, the new chair won't charge because it hasn't been used in two years.

So what does Diane do? She tells Charlie she will take it over to the Medical Supply Store that's just a block away and see if they can put new batteries in it or get it working.

So I loaded the chair back into her van, and they all took off to get the new chair up and running.

Let me tell you, in 13 years of law enforcement and security work, I've never seen anything like that.

The funny thing was Diane actually told me I was an angel for helping Charlie get around the office.

No, ma'am it's you.

## Northwoods Notebook: How about a “co-working” office space for Cumberland? by Larry Werner

A few weeks back, I wrote a column about empty storefronts downtown and asked for ideas on what types of businesses could take up the space. I suggested we need some entrepreneurs to try their luck, and I asked for some ideas from you, Dear Readers.

I got only one response, which could mean you don't have ideas, that you didn't want to take the time to email or (sadly) no one reads this column. The only response I got suggested we expand our food co-op, as has happened recently in Luck. I suppose the Schneider Pharmacy building could house an expanded co-op and bakery.

Then, of course, we'd have to find a new tenant for the co-op building.

A recent story about Vermont suggests a business someone could start in the Schneider building or another building downtown. National media reported on Vermont's state government offering \$10,000 to anyone willing to move to that state who has a job and can work from home. For example, someone working for a company in Minneapolis can move to Vermont and continue to work remotely for the Minnesota company from the comfort of his or her home in the mountains of Vermont. And get \$10,000 from the state.

My idea is to establish what is called a “co-working” space in downtown Cumberland where people can get a desk and internet connection for a small monthly rent. People who work primarily on computers can go to COC (Cumberland Office Co-op) and do their jobs for employers elsewhere.

Unlike the Vermont program, which calls for these transplants to work at home, the COC tenants could work in our little downtown alongside other “co-workers,” rather than in the isolation of a home office. Someone working as a writer, editor, marketer, computer coder or in another job would be able to live on Beaver Dam, walk to work, work out at Sunshine Fitness at lunch and meet the family for dinner at one of our fine eating establishments, or meet friends for drinks a few minutes from work.

Instead of spending an hour commuting to downtown Minneapolis or St. Paul from a suburb, you'd spend a few minutes walking or biking to downtown Cumberland, and instead of spending \$250,000 on a starter house, you could buy a large home on a lake for that much or less.

I spent more than 40 years working and living in large metropolitan areas, and I'm now fortunate to live in a condo on a beautiful lake. Of course, I'm retired. But there's no reason I couldn't have written or edited for a Minneapolis newspaper from The Island City. Jeanine Nugent does social-media marketing for a company in Georgia. Her office is one of our local coffee shops, or her home. Jeanine is a social person, and I would guess she'd rent a desk in a co-working office if one were opened.

The Minnesota Department of Transportation is closing the primary downtown Minneapolis exit off Interstate 35W, which is the busiest highway in the state. Thousands of commuters will have to find other ways to get to work there, and I can only imagine the frustration those folks will feel over the several years the I-35W rebuild is happening. Couldn't many of those

## WisDOT: Nightly closures at US 53 and County Highway O Interchange to begin week of June 18

Motorists can expect full ramp closures weeknights (8 p.m.-7 a.m.) during construction.

On June 18, 2018, Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) is scheduled to begin a resurfacing project at the US 53 and County O interchange in Rice Lake (Exit 140). Proposed construction includes milling off several inches of the existing asphalt surface and placing new pavement on the interchange ramps and the County O roundabouts. There will be no changes to the sizes or shapes of the roundabouts or ramps.

The work at County Highway O will take place during nighttime hours from 8:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. Motorists can expect the interchange, as well as County O near US 53, to be fully closed during these hours. Message boards will be placed along County O at Main Street and West Av-

enue to alert drivers of the closure. Motorists will be required to use WIS 48, Augusta Street or Allen Street to cross US 53.

The work at County O is part of a larger project along US 53 throughout Chippewa and Barron Counties. Monarch Paving Company is the prime contractor for the \$2.5 million project. This project is funded with state transportation dollars.

Construction is currently scheduled for completion by June 26, 2018. County O and the interchange ramps will be open during all weekend hours.

## Del Monte Vegetable Trays Pose Potential Health Risk

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS), the Minnesota Department of Health, and local health departments are investigating an increase of Cyclospora infections [1]. To date, 11 ill patients in Wisconsin and three in Minnesota have reported purchasing a vegetable tray from a Wisconsin or Minnesota Kwik Trip location prior to their illness. The Del Monte vegetable trays sold at Kwik Trip contained broccoli, cauliflower, carrots, and dill dip and may have been available at other retail locations. Further details on distribution are pending. Consumers should not eat the following products:

- Del Monte Vegetable Tray (containing broccoli, cauliflower, carrots, and dill dip) 6 oz.
- Del Monte Vegetable Tray (containing broccoli, cauliflower, carrots, and dill dip) 12 oz.

Kwik Trip is cooperating with state officials and voluntarily removed this product from their stores.

Cyclospora is a parasite commonly found in developing countries. People

diagnosed with this infection in the U.S. often report having travelled; however, during the summer months, outbreaks and illnesses occur as a result of contaminated fresh produce entering the U.S. food market from endemic countries. Symptoms of Cyclospora infection include:

- Frequent watery diarrhea
- Loss of appetite and weight
- Cramping, bloating, and/or increased gas
- Nausea (vomiting is less common)
- Fatigue
- Low-grade fever

If you have any of these symptoms, see your health care provider who can provide appropriate treatment. It may take a week after consuming the product for symptoms to begin. DHS is continuing to conduct interviews with individuals who test positive for Cyclospora. Ill consumers are also encouraged to contact their local health department.

The investigation is ongoing. Additional details will be shared once they are known.

## Spooner Sectional...

"People came from all over northern Wisconsin. Imagine crowds of up to 2,000 packing the old gym and nearly 4,000 in Antholz. It wasn't just another tournament, it was the event each year in March. I wanted to preserve the historical record, but I also wanted to give readers a feel for the challenges faced by teams trying to get to the state tournament. You had to be the lone survivor out of every school from Eau Claire northward. In 29 years only 14 different schools made it."

"Cumberland is a big part of the story," he added. "The Beavers made the single-class sectional tournament six times; in 1943, '57, '65, '67, '70, and '71. Of course, the two years that stand out are 1965 and 1971 when they won the sectional and went to the state tournament."

In 1965 they beat Ashland 98-90 for the title. Many folks feel that was the greatest championship game in sectional history."

While each year of the tournament is given full coverage, the book also includes chapters on the opposition that arose from some of the northern schools, the fire in the old gym, the building of legendary Antholz Gymnasium, and the story of a somewhat mysterious second sectional tournament that was played in Ashland in 1950. "The games and players are certainly the focus," remarked Kumpula, "but there's a lot more to the story than just a ball and a basket."
