The young and old, sports and arts, health and wellness, educational groups and the fire district are all represented in the list of recipients.

Included in the *Advocate* this week is the flyer for this year's fund raising drive. The United Fund urges you to read it carefully. It lists the recipients, the Board of

Directors (which is made up of representatives from all aspects of our community), and tells you how to make donations and nominate other causes or organizations for consideration by the United Fund.

The Board of Directors also invites you to attend their Annual Meeting. The date has yet to be determined but will be announced in the *Advocate*. The meeting is open to the public and offers a great opportunity to help support this organization that does so much to support our community. They are always open to new membership or input from the community and would welcome presentations from groups or organizations who would like to apply for funding. Changes to Utility Charter and more annexations at October City Council

The October 2nd meeting of the City Council started promptly at 7:00 p.m. After dispensing with the usual action items, the council got right down to business by adding to the 375 acres of land which have been already annexed to the City in the past year. The Council approved two more annexation requests, a road right-of-way on 22nd Ave., and the Cumberland Golf Course.

By unanimous roll call vote, the council approved a change to the Utility Commissions Charter. The change reverses a previous revision to the Charter and returns more oversight control to the City Council.

The council also approved

the purchase of a used forklift for the WWTP.

At a cost of \$7,445, the council approved a check valve replacement quote for lift #5.

The council also voted to raise the camping fees at Eagle Point up by \$5 per night and to increase the rental for the GAP Pavilion at Tourist Park by \$5 to \$25 per day.

Also passed was a resolution for Strategic Transportation Aids. The resolution supports a movement to increase transportation funding aids from the state.

Due to election night on Tuesday, November 6th, the next regular meeting of the council is scheduled for Wednesday, November 7th at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall.

Intergalactic Packer fans at ETC

If you liked last fall's play at the Cumberland Arts Center, you'll enjoy the one Enrichment Through Culture (ETC) is presenting this fall. It's from the same playwrights who wrote "Guys & Does," which filled the arts center with people and laughter during the 2017 deer-hunting season.

"Packer Fans from Outer Space" opens Oct. 25. The ETC players also will present this musical comedy Oct. 26 and 27 and again Nov. 1, 2 and 3. All performances are at 7 p.m.

The production is from Northern Sky Theater in Door County, where Fred Heide and Lee Becker write plays about happenings in

northern Wisconsin.

This play is based loosely on a 1952 UFO sighting in Door County and a tie game between the Packers and Bears in 1953. Harvey Keister, a Packer fan played by Tom Toftness, is called upon to save the planet from evil Space Bears.

The play is being directed by Ann Kysely and Dan Hoffmann, who co-directed *Guys & Does* last year.

He promised he would do a concert in Cumberland after his commitment to the TV program is finished.

There's a cynical expression that "Nice guys finish last." I don't know how far Kroeze will go against some amazing singers who are part of the show this year. But I doubt Chris is going to finish last, and he's unquestionably a nice guy.

Not only does he agree to appear for a relatively small amount of money at such venues as Library Lake, Nezy's, the Cumberland Arts Center and The Five O'Clock Club, but he takes his guitar to entertain our troops in Afghanistan and Iraq. When he mentioned that on TV last Tuesday, the *Voice* judges gave him a second standing ovation.

The first one came after he completed a chilling rendition of Stevie Ray Vaughan's "Pride and Joy." At the end of the song, he gave a wave to his family members who were standing in the wings before telling the celebrities in the judges' chairs that he's "Chris Kroeze, and I'm 27, from Barron, Wisconsin."

Blake Shelton said he's from Oklahoma and didn't even know how to pronounce

to eat and listen to the kid's country and rock. But we wanted to hear more. So we sat in the beautiful gardens below the restaurant's deck.

The crowd that night spilled beyond the barricades we set up in front of the stage. And when I asked this nice guy from Barron to play in our second season, he agreed immediately.

When he called to cancel, I could tell he was genuinely sorry. And I have no doubt he'll be back on a stage in The Island City when his time on national television is over, even if he goes from "The Voice" to Nashville and a recording contract.







Inside Wisconsin

Wisconsin's business support systems are helping young companies survive

MADISON, Wis. – The nation's leading foundation for the study of entrepreneurship recently called a timeout on its annual series of reports on small business activity, citing a "new direction in research strategy" that will lead to retooling over the next year.

That means for 2018, at least, Wisconsin will be spared another curiously abysmal ranking in the Kauffman Index of Startup Activity.

Unfortunately, it also means Kauffman won't update its 2017 Index of Main Street Entrepreneurship, which in recent years has cast Wisconsin in a different and positive light.

The Main Street report in 2017 ranked Wisconsin second among the 25 largest states (behind only Minnesota) in a vital category that combined three factors: the five-year small business survival rate; the percentage of adults who owned a business as a primary job; and the number of small businesses per 1,000 companies of all sizes.

That's testament to many factors that help define Wisconsin, from an old-fashioned work ethic to bootstrapping tactics that stretch dollars longer to stubbornness when it comes to accepting failure.

It's also evidence that star-

tups and scale-ups in Wisconsin can usually find help when they look for it.

In the 2017 Main Street report, Kauffman calculated that 50.77 percent of Wisconsin startups stayed in business for the first five years of existence. That was good for sixth among the 25 largest states and second in the Midwest behind Ohio.

Kauffman also reported that 6.46 percent of Wisconsin's adult population owns a business as a main job (6.46 percent), fifth in the top 25 and second in the Midwest.

For every 1,000 companies of all sizes in Wisconsin, Kauffman calculated, about 704 are small businesses. That was good for third among the top 25 states and second in the Midwest behind Ohio.

Taken together, the picture emerges of a state with a significant number of small businesses and entrepreneurs that have passed the test of time.

One reason for that healthy mix is the business ecosystem for young companies in Wisconsin, which has grown sharply in the past decade or so.

A few weeks ago, for a presentation to an advisory board for the WiSys Technology Foundation, I used a slide that charted some of the players in Wisconsin's infrastruc-

ture for young businesses. It included about 30 organizations and events – an off-the-cuff number that might easily have been doubled or tripled with a bit more research.

Most of those organizations, events and support systems didn't exist 10 or 15 years ago, and some are younger still. It shows Wisconsin has been steadily building public and private capacity to help entrepreneurs and young companies make it through their individual "valleys of death" and closer to the promised land of business success.

A prime example of that deeper support system are the series of activities taking place in early November, when "Startup Wisconsin Week" takes place around the state in venues large and small.

The biggest single event will be the Wisconsin Early Stage Symposium in Madison, which will cover parts of three days and involve speakers, panel discussions, workshops and about 40 young companies pitching to potential investors.

The lineup extends to Appleton, Beloit, Eau Claire, Fond du Lac, Green Bay, Kenosha, Racine and Milwaukee, among other cities, with more than 40 Milwaukee events alone spread over the Nov. 5-11 week.

"There are many more ways for entrepreneurs to connect today than in the past, and to learn from themselves and others," said Matt Cordio, founder and president of Startup Milwaukee, a convener for the Milwaukee events. "Those opportunities can help businesses get on their feet and to stay up."

Wisconsin isn't California, Massachusetts or even Colorado when it comes to sheer startup numbers, but it stands out as a place where young businesses stand a better chance to survive.



Sgt. Devine conducted

a strip search of Olson, and during the course of this search, she discovered Olson had concealed on her person a small piece of paper and within the folds of this paper she observed what appeared to be, white powder. Sgt. Devine advised that Olson had hidden this paper in her underpants. Deputy Cook took custody of the paper and field tested a sample of the white powder and obtained a positive result for the presence of methamphetamine, which weighed approximately .01 grams.

Deputy Cook and Corrections Officer Schwartz conducted an interview of Olson, who denied ownership of the methamphetamine, found in her property bin. She said she received the methamphetamine that was found in her underwear from another inmate. She declined to take a UA test.

If convicted Olson may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than three years and six months, or both. Her driving privileges may be suspended for not less than six months or more than five years. Her preliminary hearing is scheduled for November 27, 2018.

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

An Outdoorsman's Journal

River Rats for a Weekend

Hello friends,
Twenty two very tough critters made their way to an island on the Mississippi River just west of Ferryville where we camped and took part in the opening of Wisconsin's waterfowl season.

Saturday, September 29th
High 54, low 30
Forty eight years ago I camped here with my brothers Tom, Mike, my Dad, the late Robert Walters. We used a 14-foot boat that was powered by a 10hp Johnson and we pulled a ten foot jon boat behind it.

Seventeen of the hunters in this group are between 22 and 29 and most of them are using mud motors. I got to camp with my 18.6 War Eagle and would be the only person in our group hunting out of a canoe.

Last night all 22 of us sat by a campfire in our tent city and had a blast. My brother Mike is here with Dick Schuster and they are here to fish. Mike has not been on this trip since 1976, because of high water and a serious cold spell the fish were not hungry.

Late yesterday I went exploring by canoe and when I jumped out of my canoe into the river my chest waders were leaking bad, as was the knee boots, and hip waders that I had on this adventure. I found one very large gash and repaired it with Gorilla Glue, remember this tip, it works, unfortunately I did not find the other leaks til the end end of the trip and was wet all weekend.

If you are on a trip like this and your waders leak, wear your rain pants, it will buy you some time before your legs get wet.

So the season opens at about 6:40 and a pair of shoveler ducks fly overhead, and I got lucky and dropped one and Ruby made an excellent retrieve. That was a good start but long story short, I would not harvest another duck for eleven hours.

My shooting was very poor and at one point in the day I went two hours without seeing a duck. At dark some people had six ducks and I would say the group average was two. It seemed everyone was talking that they could not hit a thing.

Tonight was another very fun night as well as a bit sad. Eleven of us were going to stay until Monday but predictions of monsoon rains that were going to cause flooding pushed the decision to pull the pin the following day.

This year two of our gang had young Labradoodles in camp and let me tell you, everyone was impressed. These dogs were tough and my stepson Joey Dushek's dog made at least 8 retrieves today. Let me tell ya for September it was cold.

We had another very interesting experience and that was when three conservation wardens came to our camp on Sunday morning. To put it mildly we learned a lot. One, every hunter is supposed to have their ducks separate and labeled. Two, no glass of any type is allowed on this part of the river. Three, you have to see the main channel from your campsite.

We were respectful and on the main channel, it was obvious no one was violating and no citations were written but here is a word of advise, do not mix your ducks with other hunters, put them in a two-gallon ziplock bag and label it.

Like so many other trips, I kept thinking about the experiences of the last 48 years camped on this stretch of river and then I would think about how addicted these young bucks are to this trip and I have to thank my dad for having the guts to bring his boys out here back in the early 70s!

Cumberland opens up the Regional as the ninth seed, playing at the eighth seed Comets on Tuesday.

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

Charter Ordinance 722

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF CUMBERLAND RELATING TO ITS UTILITY COMMISSION

The Common Council of the City of Cumberland do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE. The City of Cumberland finds that the ownership and operation of water and electric utilities by the City is in the public interest. To that end, the City has long entrusted the management of its water and electric utilities to an independent and nonpartisan body, the Cumberland Utility Commission. This ordinance is intended to recodify the powers of the Utility Commission.

SECTION 2. SUCCESSOR STATUS. The Utility Commission established under this ordinance is a successor to the City's existing Utility Commission. It has all the rights, duties, powers and interests which the existing Utility Commission possesses, whether granted by ordinance, statute, contract or otherwise. The existing Commissioners shall serve the remainder of their present terms of office.

SECTION 3. CHARTER ORDINANCE. By this ordinance, the City is exercising both its powers under sec. 62.11(5) and sec. 66.0805, Wis. Statutes, and its home rule powers as to matters of local concern pursuant to Art. XI, sec. 3, Wis. Constitution, and sec. 66.0101, Wis. Statutes. The City finds that the details of the operation of the Utility Commission, including but not limited to the specific powers entrusted to the Commission, financial procedures and the method of selection and terms of Commissioners are matters of paramount local concern and, as to those matters, the City is exercising its home rule powers and elects to establish the Commission as set forth herein.

SECTION 4. Section 1.11 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Cumberland is repealed and recreated to read:
1.11 UTILITY COMMISSION.

(1) CREATION. There is hereby created an independent and non partisan Utility Commission to manage and operate the electric utility and water utility of the City.

(2) MEMBERSHIP; TERMS. The Utility Commission shall consist of five Commissioners. One of the five Commissioners shall be an alderman, who shall serve on the Commission without additional compensation and whose term shall be for one year. The remaining four Commissioners shall be citizens of the City, each of whom shall serve a five year term and whose terms shall be staggered so that no more than one Commissioner's term shall expire each year. The Mayor shall be an ex officio member of the Commission without the authority to vote.

(3) APPOINTMENTS. The Mayor shall nominate and the City Council shall elect the Commissioners at its organizational meeting in April for terms to commence on the May 1 following appointment. In the case of a vacancy on the Commission, the City Council at a regular meeting may appoint a Commissioner to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the term.

(4) POWERS OF COMMISSION.

(a) Charge and Management. The Commission shall take entire charge and management of the City's electric utility and water utility, and any other public utility authorized by the City Council. The Commission shall have full authority to supervise the operation of the utility subject only to the general control and supervision of the City Council.

(b) Manager. The Commission shall appoint a Utility Manager, fix his compensation and duties and provide for the authority of the Manager to act on behalf of the Commission.

(c) Other Employees; Consultants. The Commission may employ and fix the compensation of such other employees as the Commission deems necessary or convenient for the management and operation of the City's utilities. The Commission may also employ the services and fix the compensation of such other agents or consultants, including

other employees of the City, as the Commission deems necessary or convenient for the operation and management of the utilities.

(d) Rates, Rules and Regulations. The Commission shall have the authority to fix rates and establish rules and regulations for the governance, management and operation of the utilities, subject to the jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin, and establish rules for the governance of its own proceedings.

(e) Contract. The Commission shall have full authority to let bids and enter into contracts in the name of the City, provided that such contracts are necessary or convenient to the management and operation of the utilities.

(f) Other Powers. The Commission shall have such other powers as are necessary or convenient to the management and operation of the City's public utilities, and the City intends that the Commission shall have full authority respecting the utilities unless that authority is specifically withheld by a uniform state statute of statewide concern.

(5) ORGANIZATION. The Commissioners shall choose from among their number a president and secretary, and shall appoint a Utility Clerk who shall perform the duties of a bonded cashier, shall keep accurate books and accounts of utility revenues and expenses, and shall perform such other duties as the Commission shall from time to time direct. The Utility Clerk, before taking office, shall give a bond to the City for the faithful performance of the duties of his office in such amount as the Utility Commission shall direct. The bond shall be approved by the Mayor and filed with the Clerk Treasurer.

(6) UTILITY EXPENSES. Utility expenses shall be audited by the Commission at its regular meeting and if approved by its president and secretary, shall be paid by check, order or draft issued by the Utility Clerk and signed by the Utility Manager and Commission president, as directed by the Commission. The Commission may authorize the payment of labor and salaries and such other regular expenses as the Commission may determine, to be paid as they become due, if approved by the president and secretary.

(7) RECEIPTS. All utility receipts shall be paid to the Utility Clerk and by him deposited at least once a month. Utility funds shall be separately accounted for by the water and electric utilities and shall be subject to disposition as the Commission shall direct.

(8) CONSTRUCTION; DEFINITION. This Ordinance shall be liberally construed to effect its purpose. As used herein, the terms "management and control" or "management and operation" shall be construed broadly and shall include, without limitation by enumeration, all authority related to the utility properties of the City, and all authority related to purchasing, acquiring, leasing, constructing, adding to, improving, conducting, controlling, operating, or managing the public utilities, and full power and authority respecting the utilities except as may be specifically withheld by uniform state statute of statewide concern.

SECTION 5. This is a Charter ordinance and shall take effect 60 days after its passage and publication unless within 60 days after such publication a referendum petition as provided for in sec. 66.0101(5), Wis. Statutes, shall be filed. In the event of the filing of such a petition in such manner, this Ordinance shall not then take effect until it is submitted to a referendum of the electors and approved by a majority of the electors voting thereon. Such petition and the proceedings for its submission shall be governed by subsection (2) to (6) of sec. 9.20, Wis. Statutes.

SECTION 6. The City Clerk shall see that this ordinance is published and filed as provided in sec. 66.0101, Wis. Statutes.
