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Northwoods Notebook: Another musical by a guy who loves The Island City *By Larry Werner*

On the stage of the Ruppel Family Theater, is a big soft-spoken fellow giving instructions to a cast he's assembled for the world premiere of "Gilligan's Island City." He's got John Westin wearing a captain's hat, sitting on a plastic bucket, at the head of a bunch of other plastic buckets that make up a make-believe tour bus that breaks down in Cumberland.

Others sitting on buckets behind John, including the captain's son, Jeremy Westin, are singing one of the songs written by the director, a 40-year resident named Dave Evenson. Chances are you know Dave, or have seen him around town, if not at the Cumberland Arts Center, then at the library or at Augustana Lutheran Church, or in one of the many other places he volunteers for any group that needs him.

Gilligan's Island City is the third musical he's written and produced about the town he moved to in 1983 when he was working for the Department of Natural Resources. The Chippewa Falls native never thought about leaving Cumberland when he retired in 2003. "This was home," he said, and that home is the setting of his three musicals - Island City the Musical, Island City, the Next Generation, and now, this takeoff on the old TV show about seven people whose sight-seeing boat gets stranded on a tropical island. Those characters, including the skipper played by the elder Westin and his bumbling first mate, played by the younger Westin, are characters in Evenson's play.

However, instead of a boat getting stranded on an island, the wacky seven get stranded in The Island City when their tour bus breaks down. While they're waiting for it to be repaired, they experience Cumberland, with visits to places including Louie's Finer Meats and Ficocello's Salon. As they visit these places, they sing songs from what Dave calls his "weird mind."

"Most songs, and all of the best ones, simply fall into my head when I'm not paying attention," Dave said. "I haven't listened to the radio in vehicles for decades, so that's one time my empty head is receptive to a song showing up or sitting in a blind or on the ice. I can remember where I was for most of the songs I've created."

Evenson got the idea for the play about 15 years ago from Pastor David Halaas, who said: "Dave! For your next show you should write Gilligan's Island City!" He had no plans to write another show until he was asked a couple years ago by music teacher Phil Warner when he was going to write another play. So he, Warner and Jeremy Westin got together and brainstormed. After a futile attempt to cast the play in 2021, it came together and will happen June 9, 10 and 11 at 7 p.m. and 2 p.m. on Sunday, June 12.

Tickets, which are \$10 for adults and \$5 for students, can be purchased at Peter & Annie's or reserved by calling 715-822-2787. And for those of you who never saw Island City, the Musical, the cast will sing some of the songs from that play in the second half of the June 9-12 performances. So for your 10 bucks (or five, if you're a student) you'll get a Double Dave Feature.

Evenson admits he never watched a full episode of Gilligan's Island. But, he says, "Its impact on pop culture in America is such that you know it, even if you haven't seen it." When I see Dave around town, I think of those retired people who say they are so busy they don't know how they got everything done when they were working. In addition to directing a play, Evenson is president of the Thomas St. Angelo Public Library board, is a board member of the ETC arts council, is active in his church and, by the way, is organizing with Lisa Barrows the 30th annual Isle City Celebration of the Arts and Crafts, which is happening the third day of the play.

Oh, yes, he will be at the June 11 art-in-the-park event, playing guitar and singing as a member of "The World's Oldest Garage Band."

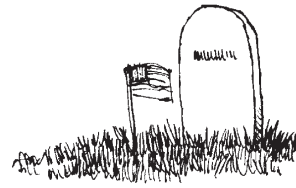

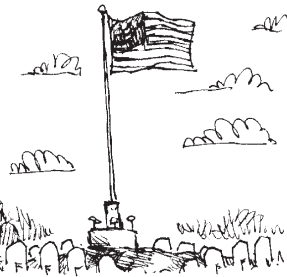

Inside Wisconsin

Business plan contest finalists capture range of ideas in Wisconsin

MADISON, WI: From three plans for cleaning large amounts of water to a nutraceutical to keep your dog from itching, and from medical science breakthroughs to novel ways to employ artificial intelligence, virtual reality and software, the "Diligent Dozen" in the 2022 Wisconsin Governor's Business Plan Contest represent a cross-section of tech innovation in Wisconsin.

Make that the "Diligent (Baker's) Dozen" ... a virtual tie in one contest category advanced 13 plans and underscores just how tight this year's competition has been so far.

That range of business plans will take center stage June 1-2 at the 20th annual Wisconsin Entrepreneurs' Conference, where the survivors of a contest that began in late January will compete on stage in Milwaukee for prizes and, more important, exposure.

People can register through the Wisconsin Technology Council to attend the conference at Milwaukee's Italian Community Center.

Organized in categories of advanced manufacturing, business services, information technology and life sciences, the contest is broad enough to attract entries that reflect the extent to which technology has become a staple in almost every industry.

It is broad in other ways, as well. First-round entries came

from people in 30 of Wisconsin's 72 counties. More than a third (37%) of initial entries were from women; a similar share (38%) came from of diverse racial or ethnic backgrounds. While many of the top 13 are from the Madison and Milwaukee areas, others hail from La Crosse, Kronenwetter, Sturgeon Bay and Fontana.

Advanced manufacturing ideas in the finals all involve water. They include an energy-efficient process to remove salt from water and convert it into valuable chemicals (such as caustic soda or bleach) and create a sustainable recovery cycle; development of a water and wastewater treatment system for removal of PFAS, which are chemicals commonly found in consumer and manufacturing products; and expanding existing municipal systems to include a decentralized, high-rate wastewater treatment technology to eliminate sewer overflows and basement backups.

Entries focused on **business services** include a web app that collects contract forms, extracts quantitative risk data using state-of-the-art AI, and automatically produces high-caliber outputs; a business-to-business wholesale marketplace that enables frictionless online transactions between RV, marine, powersports and automotive dealers; and an

engineering camp and events for middle-school girls, taught by female role models, to help girls to see their potential as engineers.

Information technology plans include an immersive virtual reality experience for molecular design of pharmaceutical products that gives researchers high-quality images; a digital platform that allows consumers to scan product UPC barcodes to get varied recycling or composting guidelines based on geographic location; a wireless wristband of sensors that allows users to directly interact with AR/VR experiences using a digital twin of their own hands; and an e-government management software with tools that help cities conduct all types of business digitally.

Life sciences plans include an over-the-counter, science-based pet nutraceutical for itch relief that is sprinkled on top of the pet's food daily; an X-ray based tool that helps vascular surgeons and radiologists better monitor blood flow during interventions; and an over-the-counter hearing aid enabling people with mild to moderate hearing loss to fit and adjust their devices without an audiologist.

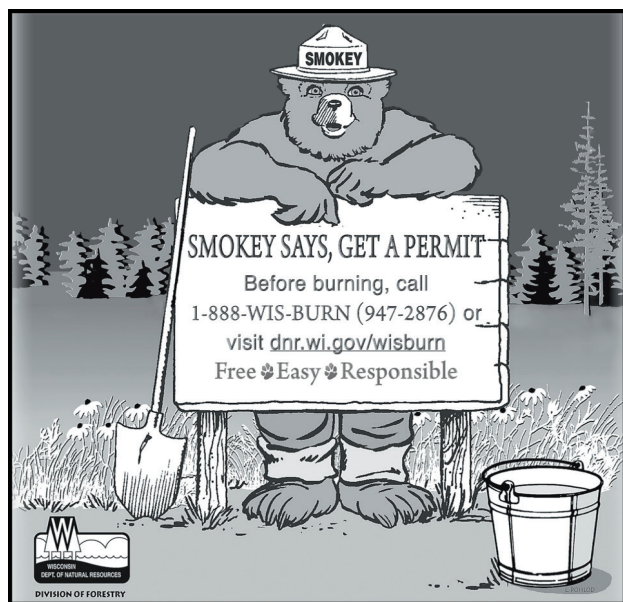
Over time, about 4,400 plans from 330 different Wisconsin communities have entered the contest. Finalists have included companies such as Atrility

Medical, RevolutionEHR, Vector Surgical, Nerites, Elucet Medical, Fishidy, Hyde, blu-Diagnostics, Strategic Fishing Systems, Optametra, Polco, RoWheels, MobCraft Beer, Sector67 and BadgerBites.

Known today as Eat Street, the founders of BadgerBites built what has become one of the nation's largest online and mobile food ordering and delivery services.

Some lunar-sized craters were left by promising finalists, too, but that's not unusual in the world of emerging companies. A more striking fact is that past finalists have enjoyed a high survival rate, especially compared to the U.S. startup mortality rate overall. Collectively, past contestants have raised at least \$250 million in angel and venture capital and venture debt - all while creating jobs and economic value in Wisconsin.

The Entrepreneurs' Conference will provide a mix of high-level speakers, panelists and more. A highlight is always the pitches of those whose business plans emerged after scrutiny by volunteer judges who know what to look for. It's worth the trip to see young companies that will make a difference tomorrow. *Still is president of the Wisconsin Technology Council. The deputy spoke with the male who handed the deputy a large stack of copies of checks from Dairy State Bank with his name having been written as the payer and Titel, the payee. The male stated Titel had stolen approximately \$2,640.00 from him.

The deputy reports he was familiar with the male having been the possible victim of a theft/forgery, after hearing via radio communications from the Barron County Dispatch on April 1, 2022, that they received a call from a female subject, who advised Titel had been stealing bank checks from the male. The deputy reports that deputies did not respond on April 1, 2022, after the male contacted dispatch stating he would be handling the situation himself. The deputy reports that, on April 6, 2022, he asked the male for more information about what happened. The male stated he is a farmer and also owns a campground in Barron County. The male hired Titel to help build a pavilion at the campground in 2020. The male stated he continued to pay Titel for doing odd jobs afterward. The male stated he mostly paid Titel cash, and only paid him with a check a few times.

The male stated in August 2021, he was hospitalized with COVID 19. The female took over milking cows at his farm for him. The female also cleaned up the male's residence while he was at the hospital. The female informed the male that she had located some loose cash in the male's residence, but, after putting the cash in a secure area, she alerted the male to the fact that the cash was missing.

The male stated on March 24, 2022, he received an overdraft letter from Dairy State Bank indicating his farm account had been over drafted. The male stated he initially thought this was a bank error because he

typically pays cash for everything and does not spend much money from the farm account. The male stated he transferred money into the farm account to avoid a continuous overdraft.

The male stated that, after speaking with Dairy State bank, he went to the drawer where he typically keeps his checkbooks and noticed one of his checkbooks was missing. The male stated he also noticed that three of the carbon copies were removed from a different checkbook. The male stated he suspected Titel was the person responsible for removing and cashing his checks, and ultimately stealing money from him, including the missing cash from his residence.

The deputy reports he examined the copies of the checks that the male had brought him to the sheriff's department. All of the checks were pay to the order of Titel, with the male being the payee. The handwriting on the checks were very similar. The first check was written on October 18, 2021, in the amount of \$100.00. The deputy reports there were 27 individual checks, the last of which was written on March 28, 2022, also in the amount of \$100.00. The deputy notes that a single checkbook typically contains 25 checks.

A detective, with the Barron County Sheriff's Department, reports he was assigned to investigate the theft/forgery complaint made by the male. The detective reports he made contact with the male who confirmed he did not give Titel permission to write out and cash checks from the male's checking account. The male stated he did not sign his name on any of his checks prior to them being stolen.

The detective reports that, after speaking with the male, he later made contact with Titel at his residence. The detective asked Titel about the male's checks. Titel admitted he took checks out of the male's checkbook. The male stated he was unsure of how many checks he took, but thought it was five checks. The male stated he wrote out the checks to himself and cashed them. The male stated he didn't know why he cashed the checks, that he needed the money, and that the male wasn't around. Titel agreed that the male did not give him permission to cash any of the checks Titel took.

The detective reports he asked Titel if he signed the male's name to all of the checks when he cashed them. The male stated he did.

The male completed a statement of loss and damages. The male estimates the amount of checks Titel wrote to himself totaled \$2,640.00. The male estimates the missing cash from his residence totaled approximately \$3,000.00.

If convicted for forgery, Titel may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than six years or both. For theft-movable property, he may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than three years and six months or both.

His initial appearance is scheduled for June 8, 2022.

Description: Removing a portion of the existing asphalt surface on US 8 and replacing it with new asphalt, paving wider shoulders and adding centerline and shoulder rumble strips, installing new storm sewer in Poskin, cleaning and lining culverts, adjusting guardrail and placing new pavement markings.

Traffic impacts: Motorists will encounter periodic lane closures controlled by flagging.

Highway: US 53 northbound

Location: Chippewa County line to US 8 near Cameron

Schedule: April 4 to October

Cost: \$11.55 million

Description: Removing a portion of the existing asphalt overlay and placing new asphalt; completing spot repairs on structures at Carlson School

Drive, County AA, the Chetek River, County I, Knapp Street, 20th Street and US 8 and placing a concrete overlay on each of the structures; replacing the concrete deck on the structure at County A; cleaning culverts and ditches; replacing culvert apron end walls, guardrail, pavement markings and signage; and completing spot improvements at Rest Area 34 and overlaying all concrete parking areas with asphalt.

Traffic impacts: A single lane of northbound US 53 will be closed for the duration of the project.

During structure rehab work, the approximate limits of the lane closures are from County M to Carlson School Road, just south of County A to Knapp Street and just south of 20th Street to US 8.

The speed limit within each work zone is 60 mph.

Flagging will be utilized as necessary on the roads underneath the bridge structures including Carlson School Road, County AA, County A, County I, Knapp Street, 20th Street and US 8.

Single-lane closures on County I at the US 53 overpass might be used

during working hours.

On Friday, June 3:

Traffic currently is scheduled to be switched from the outside lane to the inside lane.

- There is a 14-foot maximum width restriction in the work zone.

An Outdoorsman's Journal

Green is the New Red

Hello friends,
I have a bit of a predicament and this is what it is. My golden retriever Ruby has a litter of pups and I am trying to figure out which one to keep. The way I live my life includes a dog at my side for much of it and that includes both my home life as well as when I travel for in the outdoors.

My goal is a physically strong, ambitious, loving and self motivated female that loves water.

This week I took Ruby and her four, six week old pups camping on the backwaters of the Wisconsin River near Portage where the main test was how either Red or Green "collar colors" reacted to both swimming and long periods of time in a canoe while I fished for bluegill and crappie.

Saturday, May 14th
High 82, low 57

So to be perfectly honest almost since birth Red was the chosen pup to be my future sidekick. My reasoning is because she was the biggest female and as these pups are loose much of the time, very adventuresome. Yesterday I got the pups their shots and took them to a lake where Green was the only one that voluntarily swam.

Let me tell you four pups in the back seat of the truck had me concerned but nothing went wrong yesterday or on the drive to Portage today. My campsite would be on the water and I could drive my truck right up to it.

The first thing that I did was wade in shallow water and none of the pups went any deeper than their knees. Next I built camp and rigged my canoe for fishing. I brought an old swimming pool liner along and set it up to keep the pups in that would not be a part of the test.

Another goal that I had for this adventure was to hit the crappie spawn. I fished here last year and put a hurting on crappie in the 10-14 inch range and was very excited for that to repeat itself. So Red and Green are on their first canoe ride and they wrestle, observe and sleep. I either anchored or tied up to a

deadfall and did not catch any crappie but had some luck on bluegill.

Here is what I came up with after four hours in the canoe, Green slept very little and seemed to be exploring the inside of the canoe or looking at the world outside of it. Red did the same but less of it but slept a lot and did some whining.

When we went back to camp with 8 gills in the basket the mosquitoes were plentiful and I started a campfire right away. It was very interesting to watch all four pups as each one had to take a real close look at the fire.

At midnight I went to the tent and decided to let all four pups and their mother sleep with me. On film this would have been comical as I was sleeping on the ground in a very small tent and every time I would fall a sleep someone would bite me in the ear or neck.

At sunrise I got up and just like in the truck, not a pup had had an accident. I put Green and Red in the canoe and went exploring, no crappie and very few gills at first. Like yesterday I had a very cool experience with a large northern pike that had grabbed onto a bluegill I was landing.

I also had a very unique experience that lasted for at least ten minutes with the largest snapping turtle that I have ever seen swimming inches from my hand. One of the gators or the snapper could easily have eaten a pup had it gone over board.

I had two interesting observations on this five hour excursion, the same type of behavior from both pups and I literally witnessed the bluegill spawn begin. The size average went from 6-inches to 8 and the action was fast and furious.

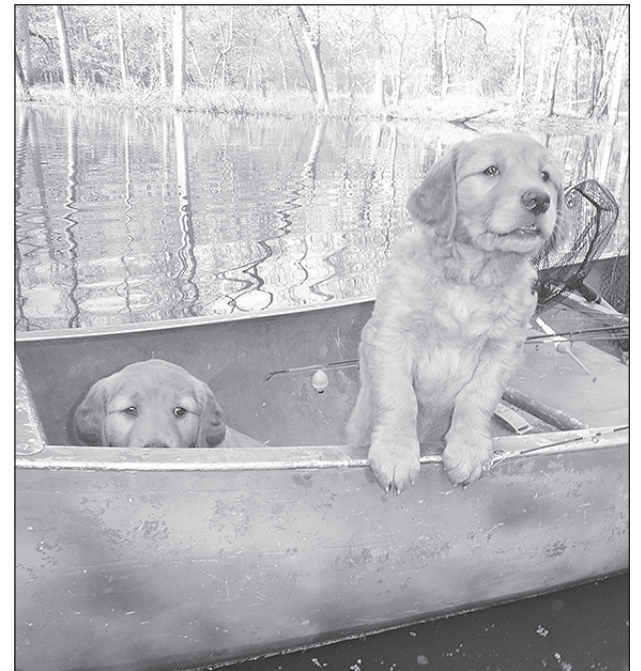
So here is probably my decision with what is now just days before all pups but one are out the door!

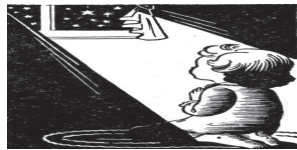

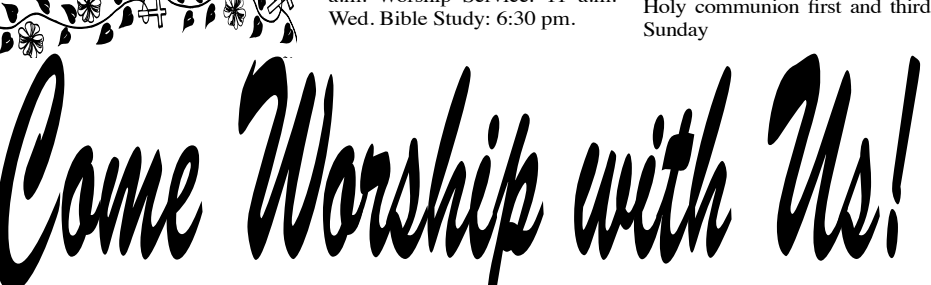

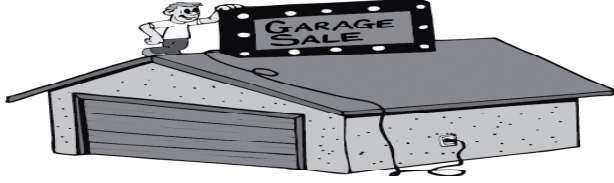

Water Safety Tips for Families

Swimming is great exercise and a fun way to spend time together as a family. With summer almost here, it is important to remember how dangerous water can be. It only takes a moment. A child can drown in the time it takes to reply to a text, check a fishing line, or apply sunscreen. Death and injury from drownings happen every day in home pools and hot tubs, at the beach or in oceans, lakes, rivers and streams, bathtubs, and even buckets. Here are ten tips to follow as you enjoy all the fun water has to offer this summer.

1. Never swim alone. Have your child swim with a friend or sibling so they can look out for one another if their parents aren't physically in the pool with them.
2. Supervise children when they are in the water. A parent should be within arm's reach of a small child at all times. Parents of older children should stay close and keep their eyes on their children at all times. The best way to remain vigilant when your children are swimming is to put your phone away and simply enjoy hanging out with each other.
3. Don't play breath-holding games. While swimming, children shouldn't hold their breath for a long time, as this can cause drowning and has several other severe risks. Make sure children understand competing to see who can hold their breath underwater and other similar games can be dangerous and should not be part of any water-related activities.
4. Always wear a life jacket. Young children or inexperienced swimmers should always wear a Coast Guard-certified life jacket around water. Remember a life jacket or other flotation device should never be an excuse to ignore other water safety guidelines. Life jackets alone are not enough when it comes to staying safe around water.
5. Don't jump in the water to save a friend- If a child sees their friend struggling to keep their head above water, their first instinct may be to jump in to help. However, doing so could lead to both people drowning. Instead, the "reach, throw, don't go" technique, is recommended. This involves using a long object to pull a struggling swimmer to safety. This technique can help children help their friend without putting themselves at risk.
6. Enter the water feet first. Injuries can happen when kids jump or dive headfirst into shallow water. Make sure your child understands the proper way to enter and exit the pool.
7. Stay away from pool drains. It is a good idea to show your child what the pool drain looks like. Explain to them the importance of staying away from them. Children's hair, bathing suits, and even limbs have become stuck in broken or faulty drains, which can lead to drowning or serious injury.
8. Stay within designated swim areas. Whether you're swimming in a pool, ocean, or lake, staying within the designated swim areas is vital to staying safe. Teach children about ropes and why people use them to divide a pool. Never encourage a child to swim in water deeper than their abilities will allow, and, especially if you're swimming in a lake or ocean, always follow guidelines local lifeguards have established.
9. Avoid using alcohol. Alcohol impairs judgment, coordination, and balance. It affects a person's ability to swim well, and it can even lower body temperature. Never consume alcohol while you're supervising your children in the water. Not only can it cause you to become distracted, but it could leave you unable to function appropriately if an emergency should happen.
10. Learn CPR. While we hope your family will follow all these guidelines and stay safe in the water, the unfortunate truth is that accidents happen. Knowing how to perform CPR can be the difference between life and death. Get your CPR certification and keep it up to date.

This year, National Trails Day falls on the DNR's 10th annual Free Fun Weekend, June 4-5, when all admission and trail fees are waived at state parks, forests and trails. From linear trails to hilly terrain, you can discover all types of trails across Wisconsin. Visit the DNR's Wisconsin State Parks webpage for trail maps, directions and park info.

"After a long winter, it's a great time to dust off your hiking boots or running shoes, get the bikes out of the rafters and head outside for some fresh air," said Missy VanLanduyt, DNR Recreation Partnerships Section Chief. "On National Trails Day, we encourage Wisconsinites to celebrate their hometown trails and show their support for our state's trail networks."

Wisconsin is home to 49 state parks, 15 state forests

and 44 state biking trails, with trails for all abilities and activities. Several properties offer dedicated trails for mountain biking, ATVs or horseback riding, but with over 24,000 acres of state trails, there are plenty of ways and places to explore. Before you go, review the Wisconsin Trail Report from Travel Wisconsin to check out general trail conditions.

If you can't make it to a state property, check out a local trail in your county or city or participate in a National Trails Day event, like Preserve Protect Explore - Sunrise to Starry Skies at the Kickapoo Valley Reserve. The DNR offers many ways to get more involved with our trails, with volunteer opportunities at most state parks, forests and trails for trail maintenance and stewardship. See all of the current volunteer opportunities on the Wisconsin State Parks' Volunteer Opportunities webpage.

Find even more volunteer opportunities by joining Friends Groups, nonprofit organizations whose members volunteer their time, services and support to

enhance Wisconsin's state parks, forests, trails and recreation areas.

Another way to get involved is to become a Trail Reporter for the Wisconsin Office of Outdoor Recreation. Trail Reporters update trail conditions throughout the summer season, and you can sign up to become one here.

Trail tips to remember on June 4:

State park vehicle admission stickers and trail passes will not be required for residents and non-residents during Free Fun Weekend.

All state parks will be open from 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. All linear/rail trails will be open to the public, including ATV and horseback riding trails.

ATVs, UTVs and off-highway motorcycles are exempt from registration requirements. Resident and non-resident all-terrain vehicle operators do not need a trail pass to ride state ATV trails.

Access Ability Wisconsin offers all-terrain outdoor wheelchairs for rent at several locations across Wisconsin, making trails more accessible to visitors of all abilities. Visit Access Ability's website for more

information and rental locations.

Cyclists of any skill level can cover some miles with Wisconsin's touring bicycle trails. Many are along former railroad corridors, like the recently re-opened Elroy-Sparta Trail.

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Click It or Ticket...

quickest and easiest steps you can take to survive a crash. Unbelted drivers and passengers make up half of those who are involved in deadly crashes in Wisconsin.

"Not wearing a seat belt can have tragic consequences. We are seeing a rise in deadly crashes across the country. Click It or Ticket is a critical awareness campaign to remind every Wisconsinite why it's so important to always buckle up," State Patrol Superintendent Anthony Burrell said.

Wisconsin's seat belt use is dropping. A seat belt survey found about 88% of Wisconsin drivers and passengers buckled up in 2021. That number was down two per-

centage points from 2019 and lags behind the national rate of about 90%.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation's seat belt awareness campaign goes beyond enforcement. Former Packers star Donald Driver teamed up with WisDOT's annual Click It or Ticket campaign this month, appearing in person at a news conference in Milwaukee and on the screen in a new animated video.

The campaign comes as Wisconsin gets ready for the first summer travel holiday of the year. The simple act of clicking the seat belt should be the first step in road trip plans as Wisconsinites prepare for Memorial Day weekend.

"Our goal with Click It or Ticket is to save lives, not just

hand out tickets. Ultimately, we would rather write a warning or citation than make a death notification," Superintendent Burrell said. "Every time we talk about the importance of using a seat belt, we have a chance to save a life. Help us achieve zero deaths in Wisconsin this summer and beyond. Always buckle your seat belt. Every trip, every time."

Wisconsin's primary seat belt law allows law enforcement to stop and cite drivers for not wearing a seat belt. Drivers can also be cited for unbuckled passengers in their vehicle. The goal is to encourage a long-term change in driver and passenger behavior.

and The Bayview Foundation. Ms. Wolf spent a decade with Kids Forward, the oldest child and family advocacy organization in the country, where she worked on behalf of children of color. Her work directly impacts countless children and families in Wisconsin.

In 2018, Ms. Wolf created and implemented a statewide campaign centered on communities of color in Wisconsin; Race to the Polls. This statewide campaign encouraged voters to consider racial equity as a top priority. It caught the attention of many stakeholders and voters while highlighting the racial and ethnic diversity of Wisconsin by creating informational materials in over 12 different languages including Ojibwe, Hmong, Spanish, and Hindi.

Ms. Wolf started working

for the State of Wisconsin in 2018 as the Deputy Chief of Staff and Policy Director for the Lieutenant Governor's office. Currently, she serves as the Deputy Director of External Affairs for Governor Tony Evers where she works closely with community organizations and elected officials. She also advises the Governor on tribal issues and climate change. She helped guide the Governor's Climate Change Task Force and was able to forward many policy recommendations which were later incorporated into the Governor's 2021-23 biennial budget.

Ms. Wolf was nominated by Ms. Lindsay Norby, Mr. Muzin LaBlanc, and Ms. Jeanette Rydberg. She will accept the award at the Cumberland High School graduation ceremony on May 28, 2022.

on the then newly deployed pantographic radiographic device, a form of focal plane tomography of the head and neck.

Dr. DeNucci was then assigned to the U.S. Army in Germany where he served as Clinic Chief at the Schwabach and Amberg Dental Clinics. Both clinics were situated strategically near the Czechoslovakian border and configured with armor, artillery, and infantry whose mission was to deter a Soviet invasion of Western Germany during the Cold War. During his time in Germany, he traveled extensively in Europe and Africa during his off-duty time. He also studied business law, sociology, and German at the University of Maryland European Campus and became fluent in German. He was promoted to Major in 1973.

Dr. DeNucci was honorably discharged from the Army in 1975 and returned to Cumberland where he established a dental practice with his wife Paula, a dental hygienist. Their

practice was the first to employ a dental hygienist and a certified dental assistant. In addition, they introduced preventive dentistry to the community and provided fluoride to children and infants to protect them from the rampant dental caries ("cavities") often seen in communities such as Cumberland where the water is not fluoridated. The practice also provided nitrous oxide sedation to patients who feared dental procedures and many other novel approaches to dental care. Dr. DeNucci was also on staff of the Cumberland Memorial Hospital and an adjunct professor in oral diagnosis with the University of Minnesota where he taught on Thursdays. He also founded and established the Northwest Wisconsin Dental Study Club which provided continuing dental education to local dentists on a regular basis.

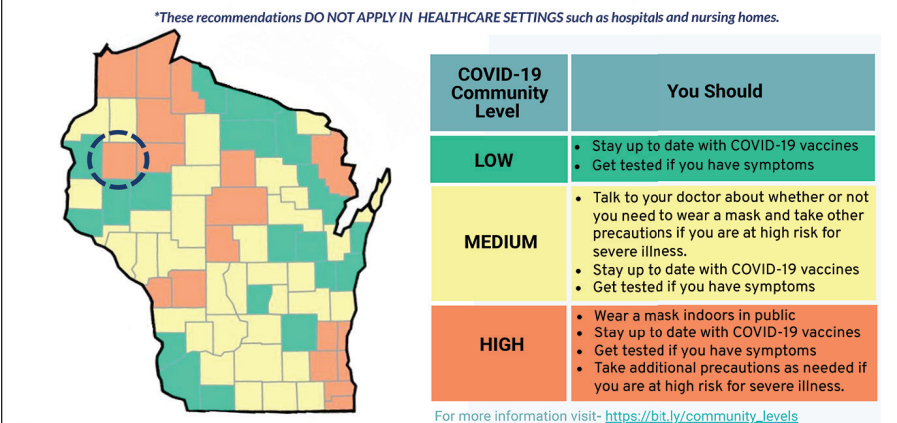

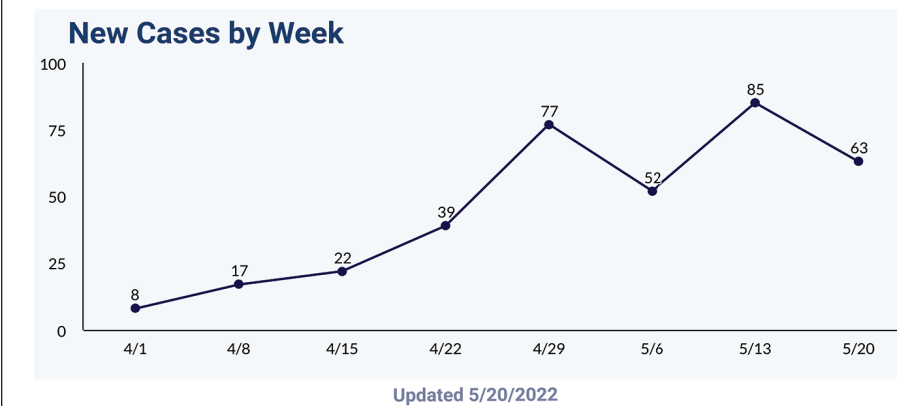
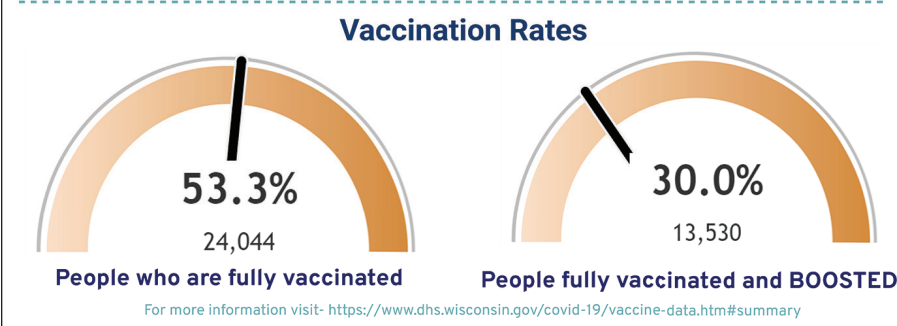
