Barron County Judge Maureen Boyle sentenced Johnson to four years in prison last week and he was also ordered to pay more than \$2,000 in restitution.












'Set your burdens down"

My guilt has overwhelmed me like a burden too heavy to bear. Psalm 38:4

In Confirmation class I used to do a little object lesson demonstration. First, I would have the kids run around the church once. Then I took out these weights that you use for working out, five pound plates that you put on a barbell. And on them I had stickers that said things like "regret," "fear," "guilt," "sin," 'selfishness" and things like that. I put those weights in a backpack and then would see if there was a volunteer to put the backpack on and then have the kids run around the church again. And of course the message was that life is so much harder if we carry those kind of burdens around with us.

One year this really athletic kid volunteered to wear the backpack. And he was still the fastest around the church. I think that was the last year I did that object lesson.

But the point is still true. We are carrying an awfully heavy load if we carry around our guilt and our sin. It can weigh us down. It can slow us up and keep us from doing what we were made to do. Carrying that burden can keep us from being who we were made to be.

But God has promised to take that burden from us. God has promised to forgive our sins and to let us set that burden down and be free


