"We encourage all Wisconsin households to have COVID-19 self-tests on hand to protect themselves and those around them."

The Butkeraites Family; A Skelly Station and Much More

Born in Germany, Herman and Margaret "Betzel" Butkeraites joined their many other countrymen who came to America in the 19th Century. Economic reasons were the most common motivation for German-speaking immigrants, whose dream was to have their own land and become financially independent. Many who could afford the expensive journey went to the American frontier states, such as Wisconsin.

Living first in St. Paul, Herman and Margaret came to Cumberland in 1828, where they ran a farm East of town. In September of 1936, they sold their farm and purchased a corner of ground from A.B. Eckland on HWY 63, where Odden Flowers stands today.

By 1936, the U.S. auto industry was producing 4.4 million passenger cars and

trucks a year and working its way out of the Great Depression. The Butkeraites saw an economic opportunity as Herman built a home with a filling station in the front through their kitchen door. This was the beginning of Cumberland's Skelly Station.

The automobile was allowing people to travel at a greater rate and further distances. Seeing this, Herman and Margaret decided to put up cabins next to their Skelly Station. The one large and five smaller cabins drew many tourist from the Chicago and Twin Cities area. They became very popular and the Advocate would say of them, "When tourist come, they can't find a nicer place to stay."

The tourist who fished our lakes could get their worm and minnow needs

Football Team Wins HON Opener Over Bulldogs

The Cumberland Beavers opened up the 2022 Conference Football season last Friday night in Chetek, with a 38-15 victory over the Bulldogs, improving their overall record to 2 and 1. The Beavers now prepare for their home opener this Friday night against the Spooner Rails, who dropped a 46-0 decision to the Conference favorite Northwestern Tigers last week. Spooner is also 2 and 1, however, on the year.

The Beavers fell behind 6-0 in first quarter action in Chetek, but rallied to lead 16-15 by the intermission. They then outscored the Bulldogs 22-0 in the second half to pull away to a nice 23-point victory.

"I really was impressed with our composure tonight when we faced some adversity with a rain delay and their early lead. I thought our kids came together as the contest continued, battling for one another to get a win. Our line really took over in the second half on both sides of the ball to help us run the ball more effectively on offense and control them defensively the final half of the contest," said Head Coach Corey Berghammer.

The running game Coach Berghammer referred to finished with 169 yards on 33 attempts, led by Edward Chafer's 72 yards on only five carries. Roman Ranallo added 52 yards on 13 attempts, while Ryker

Allen had 41 yards on four rushing attempts. Chafer, Ranallo, and quarterback David Olson all had rushing touchdowns on the night.

The Beavers added another 112 yards passing as Olson completed six of 14 passes, two of which went for scores. Those six-pointers came from Jax Effertz and Vaughn Johnson, with Effertz leading the Beavers with three catches, good for 57 yards.

Defensively, Chetek-Weyerhaeuser found most of their offensive success on the ground, rushing for 191 yards on 40 attempts. They would only complete five of 15 passes for 35 yards, with the Beavers putting on good pressure and getting sacks from Ranallo and Lucas Simon.

Ryker Allen had a big game defensively with 11 tackles, including one for a loss, while Simon had six tackles. Ranallo, Vaughn Johnson, and Dylan Capra added five each. The Beavers held the Bulldogs to only three first downs in the second half.

The Rails two victories have come over Elk Mound 29-21 and Hayward 21-6 as they look to rebound from their loss to Northwestern last Friday. The Beavers, meanwhile, played some excellent ball over the last 24-minutes of their victory over C/W and will look to take this momentum into the 7:00 pm start.

Volleyball Team Plays in Elk Mound; In Chetek on Saturday

The Cumberland Volleyball Team traveled to Elk Mound for a quad last week, falling short against the Mounders, Eau Claire Regis, and St. Croix Central. The team was back in action on Tuesday in a home triangular, before heading to Chetek this Saturday for their Invite. Action begins in Chetek at 9:00 am.

Cumberland dropped a 15-11 decision to Elk Mound in the final set to lose their match two games to one. "We had a great team effort against a good squad and showed improvement throughout the contest," said Head Coach Erin Miller.

The team also did some other things well during the entire quad, despite falling short in the three matches.

Siri Hyatt led the team with 20 kills and three blocks on the night, while adding 17 digs, just one short of team leader Orion Thompson, who had 18. Omalley Thompson, Maddy Monchilovch, and Madison Graf each had three serve aces, while Teagan Monson added 13 digs on the evening.

"We are looking forward to getting back into action and picking up some wins this week," added Coach Miller.

Cross Country Team Runs in Spooner

The Cumberland Cross Country Team headed to Spooner last week for the Rail Invitational, where both the boys and girls finished 10th out of 12 teams. The Northwestern Tigers took home first in both competitions.

For the girls, Barron's Fran Peterson ran a 20:18 to take first, while the top Cumberland runner was Carly McCreary, who finished ninth with a 23:37. Andie Otto ran a 25:37 to finish 24th, while Jasmine Woodley was 47th with a time of 29:11.

In the Middle School competition, Harper Sheehan of Hayward won the event with a run of 11:26, while Cumberland's Jovina Skinner was 10th with a time of 13:06 and Greta Weaver finished 18th with a

time of 14:18.

Sophomore Gavin Stewart of Ladysmith won the Rail Invitational, where the boy's race with a run of 17:46, while Jacob Schradle was Cumberland's top finisher with a time of 20:40. The Beaver's Josh Swint added a 24th with a time of 20:53 and Tommy Dettinger was 51st with a time of 22:33.

An Outdoorsman's Journal

Green Bay for Walleye

This past week I headed to Green Bay with my 18.6 War Eagle, both of my golden retrievers Ruby and her 5-month-old pup "Red" for two days on the water and a night of camping. My plan was to troll for walleye and see what I could catch.

Monday, August 22nd
High 82, low 57

The old Chevy would turn 350,000 miles this week and it still has its original motor, tranny, and exhaust. To be honest I was very satisfied to see it do an excellent job pulling the War Eagle to Little Suamico where I would launch at Geano Beach.

Anytime that you put a boat in the water with a plan of camping and fishing it's kind of a big deal to have all of the right gear. I had the gear and secured some solid advice at the landing and that was to head out to 27-feet of water and troll with night crawler harnesses.

The last time that I launched at Geano Beach was with a canoe and I limited out on walleye and caught a 47-inch musky on a crawler harness. I had no idea the musky was a musky and it pulled me around for a half an hour before I saw it.

The time before that I was three miles from shore, fishing in the War Eagle and I got a call from Jeff Moll that a bad storm was going to hit. I got whacked hard on the ride back to the launch and it was one of the top 10, "I should have died" experiences of my life.

Today would be different, almost no wind, sunny skies and it seemed like there was at least a hundred boats on the water. I would be pulling two crawler harnesses or a crankbait that I would switch about every two hours as I experimented.

I had been trolling for four hours and had not had a hit when one of my rods with a crawler harness started bending and it was fish on. The fight was great and soon I netted what would be a 27-inch walleye. As far as I was concerned my trip was success.

It seemed that my action was slow but steady, three hours later I had my next strike and this time I caught a 24-inch walleye and I was a very happy camper. It seemed 27-feet of water with my harness back, 100-feet behind my planer board was the right number and my third and last hit of the day came just before dark and it was another 24-inch walleye.

I pulled lines, headed to some private land which was remote and beautiful, built camp, and slept on the sand with my two pups.

Tuesday, August 23rd
High 84, low 53

I had camp broke and was on the water before sunrise with high hopes. I joined the growing pack of fishermen in deep water and let me tell you it is quite world out there. Trolling with planer boards is a game of skill and common sense, especially when you are alone. You have to be wise or you are going to have an almost constant issue with other trollers and when you get a fish on, especially a good one, getting it in the net and not messing up your other lines is a very cool challenge.

I did not get a hit until I had been fishing for three hours and my first whack would be an 18-inch walleye and that made me feel like I was doing something right. In some ways I am extremely patient and when it comes to trolling and tip up fishing I am very patient. You have to be checking your lines at least

every fifteen minutes or you will be weeded up which means that you are wasting your time.

It would be another three hours before I had another chance and this fish would be another 24-inch-er which made me very happy.

The pups were awesome in the boat and to keep them cool I just put wet towels over their bodies and they were fine. Red and Ruby always wrestle and Red is probably the sweetest golden retriever that I have ever had.

I needed a trip like this and was thankful that it worked out with relative ease. Live large!

Nominations of Wisconsin PK through 12 teachers and principals can now be submitted online at KohlEducation.org for the 2023 Herb Kohl Educational Foundation teacher Fellowship and principal Leadership awards. The deadline for submission is Tuesday, October 4, 2022 at 5 p.m. central time. Awards are \$6,000, with an additional \$6,000 grant going to the school of each selected teacher and principal. Established in 1990, the Herb Kohl Educational Foundation awards 100 Fellowships and 16 Leadership awards annually from among all applicants throughout the state.

For teachers or principals to be considered, they must first be nominated by a parent, student, other teacher, communi-

ty member, or school administrator. Wisconsin teachers and principals in grades PK through 12 who plan to continue in their current capacity for at least one year are eligible. The Herb Kohl Educational Foundation Fellowship rewards teachers who have demonstrated superior ability to inspire love of learning in their students, have motivated others, and have provided meritorious service both in and outside the classroom. It also recognizes and supports principals who demonstrate administrative leadership and positively influence school culture.

Online nominations must be submitted at KohlEducation.org by Tuesday, October 4, 2022 at 5 p.m. central time. Selection of recipients will be

made by a state-level panel composed of representatives from the Wisconsin Newspaper Association, cooperative educational service agencies, several education-related associations, and community representatives. Since the program was established in 1990, the Herb Kohl Foundation has awarded 3,430 grants to teachers and principals, and 3,430 matching grants to their schools throughout the state for a total of \$15,956,000.

The Herb Kohl Educational Foundation Fellowship and Leadership programs are co-sponsored by the Wisconsin Newspaper Association Foundation, Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, and the state's 12 cooperative educational service agencies.

Northwoods Notebook: When Bob comes to town, we line up for corn

I think it was the first summer we were here when our neighbor, Carol Horn, shouted across the driveway one day that Bob's Barronett Produce was in town and that we should head to the four corners for the best peaches-and-cream sweet corn we'd ever eat.

How strange: An old pickup filled with corn is a major event in this little town of ours. We got in line that day seven or eight years ago, and every year since. Now that it's late in the season, the lines seem to be getting longer, perhaps because people realize that the biggest bargain in corn is going into hibernation soon.

Ann and I were walking up to Peter & Annie's last Friday, and our neighbor, Denny Zahrbock, zipped past on his UTV. We heard his wife, Sue, yell something about not forgetting the watermelon – something else sold off the old pickup. We finished our lattes at the coffee shop before Denny got to the head of the line for his corn and melon.

My brother and his wife were here for Baga Fest weekend. They live in a suburb of Detroit. During their weekend here, we spent a lot of time downtown, and they were blown away by what they called the "small-town life" we live. Everybody seems to know everyone else, and people always have time and a smile for each other.

They said they can understand why two people who had spent their work lives in big cities have taken to life here in The Island City. And what could be more small-town than neighbors telling neighbors that the corn truck has arrived.

Unfortunately, my brother and his wife couldn't get a taste of Bob's corn. The truck wasn't there on Baga Saturday when we were planning steaks from Louie's and corn from Bob's. We got some corn from a store, but it didn't match up to those sweet white and yellow kernels you get from the Barronett

from inside the Filling Station. A side door into the basement found a toilet and shower for use by those renting the cabins or an occasional neighbor. They were a significant luxury for the times. The cabins were usually filled all summer with clean sheets furnished to the occupants daily.

Sadly, in May of 1942, Herman would become sick and pass away at the young age of 43. With Margaret left alone, her mother and father, Henry and Marie Betzel, moved into town from Duck Lake to help her maintain the cabins.

In 1943, The Advocate would say of their work, "They are about the cleanest and most attractive places we've ever seen and the grounds around the cabins and station are lovely." Margaret surrounded the place with petunias and sweet peas, which visitors said they could always smell.

As WW2 went on and rationing took place, Margaret planted a big garden where she grew her own food and canned between 200 and 300 jars of fruit and vegetables a year. She would add an additional job at the Company Store and when her limited free time permitted she loved to crochet, read, and listen to Orchestra music. When possible, she loved to get together with the girls from the Company

Store where, "She loved to work."

By February of 1945, things became a bit too hectic for her and she turned the operation of the filling station over to Glen Miller. She began to spend more time away and was given a birthday party and a farewell gift at a party given by Mrs. August Eckland, the family from which they had bought the land originally. With this, Margaret left the area she'd spent the past 17 years and headed back to St. Paul.

Margaret eventually remarried and ended up in North Dakota, where she passed away in 1954. Her niece, Mary Ellen Betzel, lives in Rice Lake. The old Skelly Station became a grocery store a few years after she departed and eventually Odden Flowers. If one drives around Oddens, you'll see a few standing remnants of the cabins built over 80 years ago. If you close your eyes and listen, you can almost hear the shouts of joys coming from a successful day on a Cumberland area lake by a Chicago visitor.

Today, the story of the Butkeraites family and their filling station and cabins may be gone from the newspaper advertisements and local headlines, but will never be forgotten. They are all part of "Island City Memories."

Inside Wisconsin

“Spurred by national science goals, Wisconsin groups think beyond geography”

MADISON, Wis. – Perhaps Wisconsin should thank the National Science Foundation for helping to pull together many of its regional science, technology and economic development players. All it took was a big challenge.

The NSF's Regional Innovation Engines program is a departure from the agency's traditional deep research focus because it calls for coordinated ideas that bridge the gap between science and tech to solve today's problems while stimulating the economy and the workforce.

In short, rather than expecting academic research centers alone to translate science into practical solutions, the NSF is asking for private industry, investors, workforce agencies, key government groups and others to get their hands dirty from the start.

Competition across the United States for this multi-billion-dollar initiative will be intense, with hundreds of concept outlines across an array of topics given the go-ahead to move to the next stage. One such outline involves about 20 partners in Wisconsin and will focus on the state's strengths in water, energy and reusing waste.

Led by The Water Council with core support from the [MKE Tech Hub](http://www.mke-tech-hub.com), the Wis-

consin Technology Council, Marquette University and the Madison Region Economic Partnership, a “letter of intent” filed with NSF also lists some major companies – A.O. Smith, Rockwell Automation and Sentry Equipment Corp.

Others include the UW-Madison's Department of Engineering Physics, the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation, the UW-Milwaukee, the UWM Research Foundation, the Wisconsin Center for Manufacturing and Productivity, the Bright-Star Wisconsin investment fund, STEM Forward, WEC Energy Group, the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District, the Urban League of Greater Madison, the Business Council, state Sen. Dale Kooyenga, R-Wis., who is tied to a U.S. Army water innovation project, and the August Brown management consulting firm.

Also on the list are the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce, the statewide Wisconsin Economic Development Corp., and regional economic groups New North – representing 18 counties in northeast Wisconsin – and Milwaukee 7, which works in seven counties in southeast Wisconsin.

It's a seemingly eclectic coalition, especially when viewed from the outside, but there is a common bond that speaks to two themes:

First, it is possible for groups that sometimes compete in Wisconsin's research and economic spheres to work together. For example, The Water Council is based in Milwaukee, but it is known nationwide and works with companies and innovators across geographic lines.

The state's regional economic development groups and chambers of commerce usually stick close to home, but they also fall within the larger “I-Q Corridor,” which is the Tech Council's branding moniker for the interstate region that connects parts of Wisconsin as well as the Chicago region. The “I” stands for interstate, innovation, intellectual property and investment, and the “Q” speaks broadly to quality of research, education, workforce and living.

Second, each group has a hand on a different part of the elephant. Sometimes, both hands or a third if they had one.

Water innovation is critical, for example, to A.O. Smith, Rockwell Automation's advanced technology and sustainability group, the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District and its innovation projects, Marquette's Water Quality Center and the UW-Milwaukee's School of Freshwater Sciences.

Manufacturers across Wisconsin care about energy costs, producing less waste and reusing what they can, as

well as smarter use of water. That includes others in the group, such as the Wisconsin Center for Manufacturing and Productivity. The UW-Milwaukee and its related research foundation work with industry on those fronts and more. The same goes for WARF, which holds patents across all those lines from UW-Madison researchers. WEC Energy Group, the UW-Madison engineering physics department have clear stakes in energy innovation.

Workforce needs are crucial to all economic development groups, and especially the MKE Tech Hub, the Tech Council and the Urban League of Greater Madison.

Results in terms of the NSF grant process won't be known for a while; perhaps not until mid-2023. Other Wisconsin-based proposals may compete across a mix of tech areas.

Regardless of outcome, these efforts have already underscored the notion that Wisconsin expertise can – and does – compete on a national stage. It can also make money and create jobs by exporting those ideas to parts of the country that are grappling with sustainability issues in water, energy and waste.

Labor and delivery services will continue at Mayo Clinic Health System — Red Cedar in Menomonie through the end of 2022. The transition of labor and delivery services from Mayo Clinic — Red Cedar in Menomonie to Mayo Clinic Health System in Eau Claire will take effect Jan. 1, 2023.

office visits during pregnancy) and postpartum care (office visits after delivery), OB-Nest (a virtual prenatal program) and gynecological services will continue to be provided at Mayo Clinic Health System — Northland in Barron and Mayo Clinic — Red Cedar in Menomonie.

In his later years he continued his voracious reading habits of at least two new newspapers a day while watching news programs and always had a book he was reading. Saying age is no excuse for not being engaged in current events, Craig did participate in his final act of civic responsibility by voting in the Wisconsin primaries on August 9th.

"There he found a man named Aeneas, bedridden for eight years, who was paralyzed. And Peter said to him, 'Aeneas, Jesus Christ heals you; rise and make your bed.' And immediately he rose. And all the residents of Lydda and Sharon saw him, and they turned to the Lord." Acts 9:33-35 ESV

Aeneas, lying there when Peter walks in, I'm sure was just happy to see a smiling face, someone to talk to, and out of nowhere Peter says, "Jesus Christ heals you, rise and make your bed." 1. No person will be allowed to appear before the board of review, to testify to the board by telephone, or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the assessor to view the property.
2. After the first meeting of the board of review and before the board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the board of review may contact or provide information to a member of the board about the person's objection, except at a session of the board.
3. The board of review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, and the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.
4. Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.
5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.
6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s. 73.03 (2a), Wis. stats., that the assessor requests. The Town of Lakeland has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph that provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court.* The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35 (1), Wis. stats.
7. The board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the board a letter from a physician, surgeon, or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other persons may testify by telephone unless the Board, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement.






