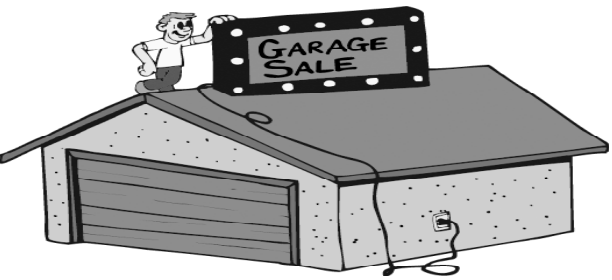

The deputy reports the Bible was identified as belonging to Jeanne as her name was written in the inside cover. The deputy reports when he reached the vehicle stuck in the mud, he approached Ray and Sager and inquired about how the phone got in the driveway. The deputy reports Ray stated that he was unsure how his phone got up the driveway near the residence and stated that he did not go that far up the driveway at any point. The deputy reports Ray stated that he believed Flynn had placed his phone in the UTV that she had driven and taken the UTV up to the residence at some point and his phone fell out of the UTV.

The deputy reports as he continued to question Sager and Ray, they both stated that they had been stuck in the driveway for approximately 1-2 days and stated that Flynn had gotten the UTV in an attempt to assist them by pulling the SUV out of the mud. The deputy reports multiple times during his contact with Sager and Ray they stated that Flynn had led them to believe that the residence and property belonged to her and that she had given Sager and Ray permission to use any

items that were necessary to get the vehicle removed from the driveway. The deputy reports Sager stated that the tires and the rims were down near his vehicle because he was going to attempt to change the tires on his vehicle to get more traction so he could get out of the mud. The deputy reports during his entire time on scene, Flynn was not located. The deputy reports Sager and Ray told him that she had left the residence the previous night of April 11th and not approximately 15 minutes before law enforcement's arrival on April 12th.

The deputy reports M.D.F. had a trail camera located on his driveway and he allowed the deputy to review the photographs saved on the SD card. The deputy reports on one photograph he observed a female he could identify as Jeanne, driving M.D.F.'s UTV westbound on the driveway toward the residence. The deputy reports on April 13th, he spoke with Jeanne at the Barron County Jail. The deputy reports he read Flynn her Miranda Rights prior to questioning and Flynn signed a waiver of Miranda Rights. The deputy reports as part of the interview he asked Flynn

if at any point she had driven and operated the UTV belonging to M.D.F and Flynn stated she had not.

If convicted for burglary of a building or dwelling and party to a crime, Flynn may be fined not more than \$25,000 or imprisoned for not more than 12 years and six months or both. For operating a motor vehicle without owner's consent, she may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than nine months or both.

If convicted for burglary of a building or dwelling, and party to a crime, Sager may be fined not more than \$25,000 or imprisoned for not more than 12 years and six months or both.

If convicted of a burglary of a building or dwelling and party to a crime, Ray may be fined not more than \$25,000 or imprisoned for not more than 12 years and six months or both.

Their adjourned initial appearances are scheduled for April 23, 2025.

Focus on the road ahead to keep Adopt-A-Highway volunteers safe; Nearly 15,000 people helped clean Wisconsin roads last year

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) reminds drivers to focus on the road ahead to keep Adopt-A-Highway volunteers safe. WisDOT initiated the Adopt-A-Highway program in 1991 to allow groups to volunteer and directly support the state's anti-litter program. These volunteers routinely collect trash and recyclables along Wisconsin roads.

We are grateful to the thousands of Wisconsinites who generously volunteer each year to pick up trash and recyclables along the roadside," WisDOT Secretary Kristina

Boardman said. "For nearly 35 years, Wisconsin's Adopt-A-Highway program has truly blossomed as nearly 15,000 volunteers participate in the program each year. Their pride to keep our state beautiful should inspire all of us to properly dispose of trash."

In 2024, Wisconsin Adopt-A-Highway groups collected more than 170 tons of trash and recyclables. Nearly 5,500 volunteer hours were reported last year to help pick up trash. WisDOT encourages more people to get involved. Our interactive map shows highway segments

maintained by Wisconsin's 3,000 Adopt-A-Highway groups, but more than 2,700 miles of state highway are still available for adoption.

Adopt-A-Highway workers are asked to clean up their assigned two-mile state highway segment at least three times per year. All volunteers must be at least 11 years of age or in the 6th grade on two lane highways and 16 years of age on four lane highways. No other persons should be on the work site. Each group must provide one adult supervisor for every five or six volunteers.
